### **Black Locust Good** For Farm Crops

From a field which had been abanfoned eleven years before and was reseeded by black locust trees, Wiliam C. Mason of the Brasstown community of Clay county cut \$90 worth of fence post from one acre and left enough sprouts from which to cut another crop in a few years.

Mr. Mason reported this experience to R. W. Graeber, extension forester at State College, when Mr. Graeber recently held a forest meeting in the county. Mr. Mason said he had also old \$70 worth of post from another

area of less than an acre. "Throughout the mountain section, to keep up registration there are no doubht many other farmers who could give similar experiences with black locust as a source of farm income." says Mr. Graeber.
