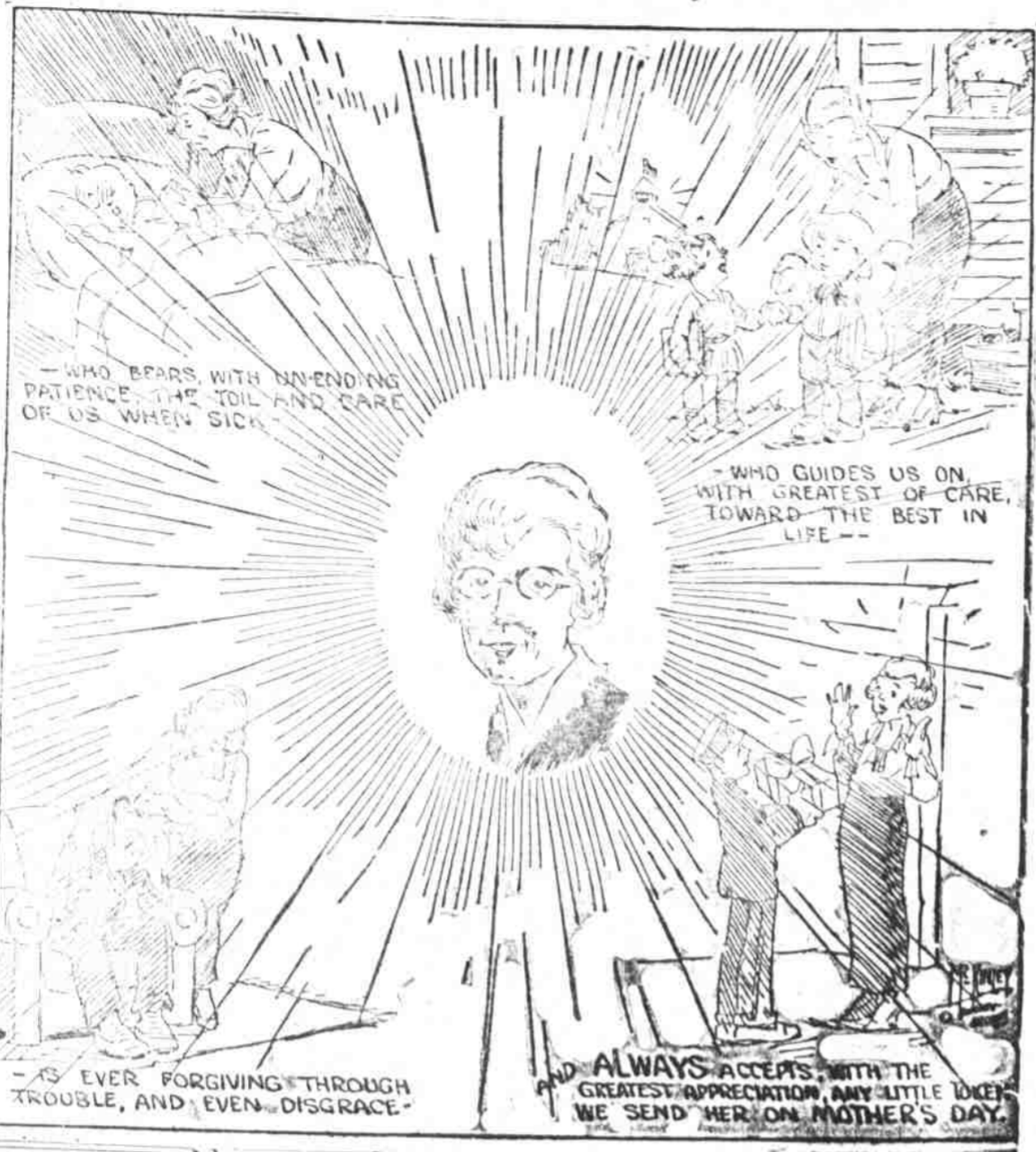

THIRTY-ONE MILLION LESS

The farmers of North Carolina received nearly thirty-one million dollars less for their 1931 tobacco crop than they received for their 1930 crop, and in 1930 farmers were quite disgruntled over tobacco prices. The 1931 crop brought a little more than forty-one million dollars, against some over seventy-two million in 1930.

It has been calculated that the property tax paid by farmers in 1930 was around eleven million dollars, while it was much less in 1931 due to state relief in road and school legislation. The above admirably illustrates the point that the trouble with farmers is not taxes but reduced income. The decline in one year was more than

...the loss... the... of the precipitous drop in... A two percent increase in the farm income would be of more value to farmers than completely exempting all farm property from taxation. Hope lies not in putting too much faith in those who promise to save a few cents in taxes, but by cooperating with those who are attempting to increase the farm income. A two-cent rise in the price of cotton will pay the entire farm tax bill. Or two cents a pound more for tobacco will pay the entire farm tax bill. Or just one cent a pound more for cotton and tobacco will bring in enough cash to meet the property tax of all farmers of the state. The small saving to
