LIVESTOCK FIELD DAY, MAY 25, ON GWYN FARM HERE

plan organization, the promotion plan can be realized effectively and with satisfactory results.

Aid To Prosperity... He believes that such a development would provide the foundation stone for permanent prosperity in Western North Carolina.

"It is an historical fact," declared Mr. Papy, "that no farming section has ever been permanently prosperous unless livestock was introduced in its farming program. The reverse is also true, that no section has ever lacked prosperity permanently that did include livestock in its program."

Mr. Papy said that he was much impressed by the genuineness of the people of this section toward a progressive development of the livestock industry.

"I was impressed with the fact that the people seem to be live stock-minded, if I may use that term," Mr. Papy declared. "The main thing that seems to have held down the live stock production in this section was the general feeling that there was no outlet or market for this stock."

"Atlanta is the center of a large consuming area and can be reached from this section either by truck or railroad at a minimum expense, and the market prices there are attractive in relation to the big markets of this section."

"Our experience has shown us that any live stock development must be preceded by and depend upon co-operation between the city business man, banker and farmer. We think the citizens of Asheville, and surrounding towns should be made to understand that the country brothers can't prosper without their co-operation."

"I think that this is unquestionably live stock territory," Mr. Papy continued in discussing the possibilities of developing a new source of wealth for the mountain farmers through increased live stock production in Western North Carolina. It will probably be necessary to increase the corn acreage, especially through increased yield per acre under cultivation for profitable hog production. Although this section already has a great deal of pasture land, according to the observations I have made in my trip through the various counties, it will be necessary to increase and improve this acreage in grass for cattle and sheep. After all no animals can be better than the food that produces them and in planning for increased live stock production the hardest part of the work is to provide an adequate food supply for the animals."

Farmers Wide Awake... He was very much impressed with the wide-awake attitude of the farmers and the manner in which they are reacting to the program for agricultural development in Western North Carolina.

"We town North Carolina newspapers should be complimented for their efforts in aiding the agriculture of this section and for what they are doing to restore prosperity to the farmers of Western North Carolina. The live stock program is the road to permanent prosperity."

Detailed plans for the operation of the live stock market so as to promote this industry in the mountains of Western North Carolina, will be announced from time to time as they take shape, it was explained. Just now the effort is being directed toward enlisting the full support of the farmers and securing their co-operation in procuring a high quality of live stock in sufficient quantities to make adequate handling and marketing profitable and to insure the future stability and prosperity of the market for this section.

Motorcades Organized... Motorcades are being organized in all the counties and it is expected that between 1,000 and 1,500 of the most progressive farmers in Western North Carolina will attend the meeting at the Gwyn farm on May 25 to see just what type of animals are most desirable and just how the plan to promote a new source of wealth for this section is to be developed.

In addition to the agricultural experts from Atlanta, Raleigh and other points, county agents and agricultural leaders from the eastern counties will be present so they can carry back to their own communities the message that will herald a new era in agricultural prosperity in this region.
