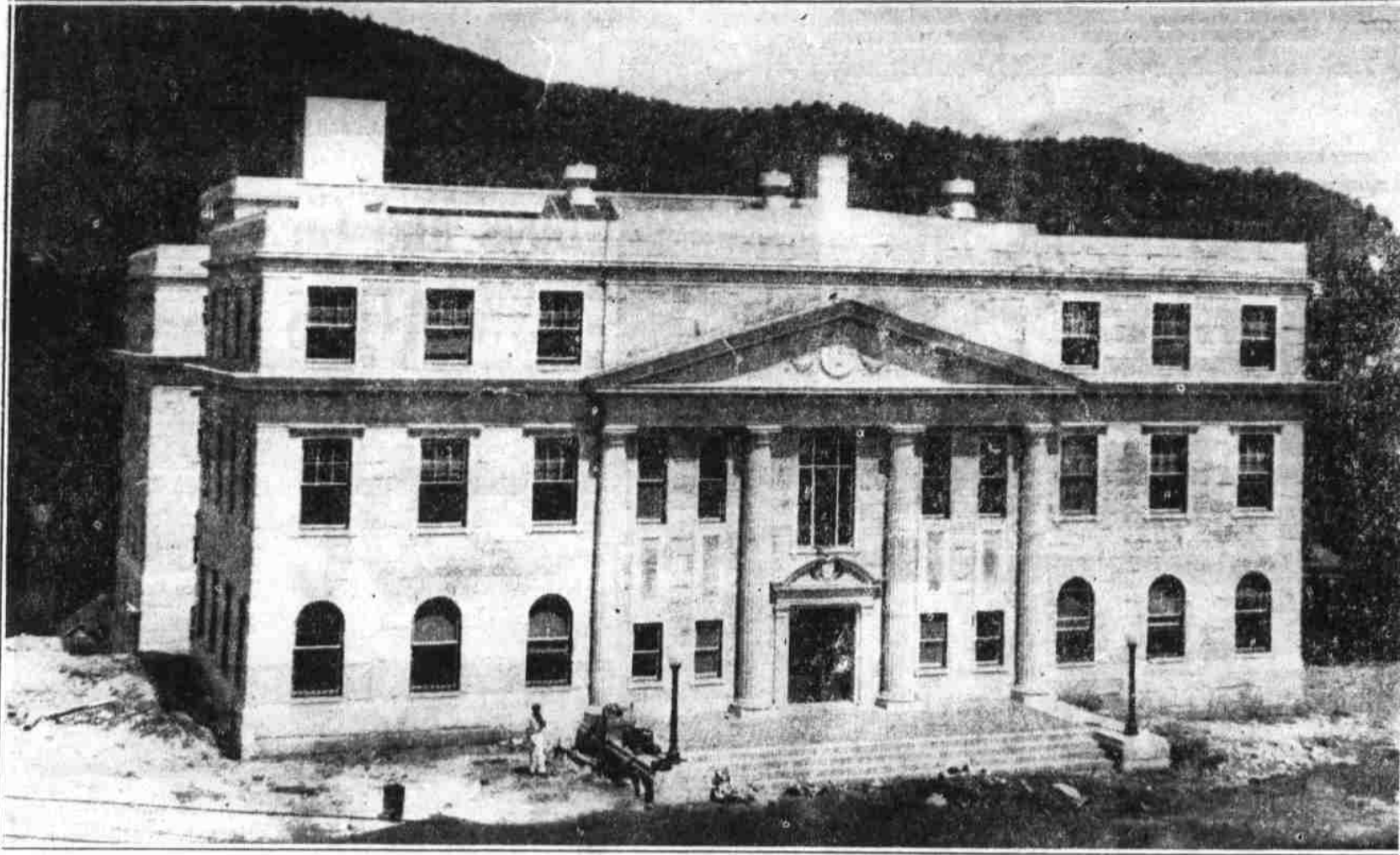


Haywood County's \$240,000 Court House To Be Dedicated September 19th
