Displays Increase At "Curiosity Shop" In Mountaineer Office

During the past week several additional things have been added to the "curiosity shop" at The Mountaineer office.

The new exhibits range from a 40

inch pod of okra to a wooden lattice with green ferns growing into it made and put together inside a pint whiskey bottle. Also, an ear of corn with the tassel growing out of the ear which is absolutely normal in every respect except for the fuzzy "head-

The okra, referred to above, resembles a long green gourd, and is of the German Okra species. It grew in the Crabtree section and was brought in by J. L. Walker. It weighs 13 pounds and measures 40 inches in

The "bottled floral display" was brought in by Jeffrie Freeman, of this city, who made and designed the tendious curiosity. The lattice is put together with nails, and under this Last Tuesday Night a small wooden pot with green ferns is growing. The bottle is of the flat, pint type, the neck being about three fourths of an inch wide. The bottle is filled with alcohol and it is expected the fern will remain green for some

The "flapper ear o' corn" was brought in by D. H. Hensley, of Way-nesville. Growing out of the top of the ear is this tassel which gives the corn the appearance of a bushy headed

Another interesting addition to the display brought in was a small purple pearl shell which was found at Deliwood by Miss Alice DeHart. An investigation of the construction of hie shell failed to reveal any facts other than it must have been lost by some

one and not deposited there by nature.

The displays are creating much interest, and hundreds stop daily to view the "sights" and pass their opinion as to the whys and wherefores of the different displays. As previously stated, all articles brought into this office remain the property of the ewner and may be had at any time.
