BRIDGE CLUB IS ENTERTAINED

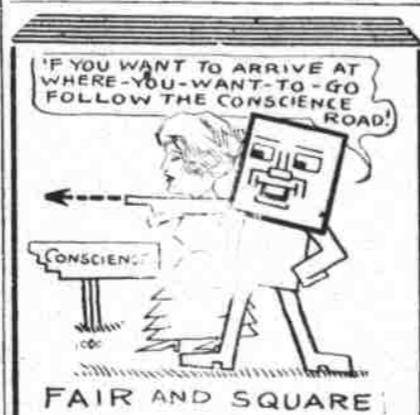
The Contract Supper Club and several additional guests were charmingly entertained Monday evening by Mr. and Mrs. Wilford Ray.
