TWENTY-FIFTH ANNUAL DECLAMATION CONTEST

Ray Burgin, member of the Senior class of the Waynesville Township High School, was selected winner of the D. A. R. medal at the twenty-fifth annual declamation contest held at the high school auditorium yesterday morning. Gordon Wyatt won second place in the judges' decision and received a silver piece as a souvenir of the occasion. Richard Queen received honorable mention.

This contest, which is sponsored annually by the Dorcas Bell Love Chapter Daughters of the American Revolution, was of peculiar interest because it marked the twenty-fifth event of its kind, the first being held in 1909 during the regency of Mrs. J. Howell Wyatt.

The regent, Mrs. T. Lenoir Gwyn, presided over the meeting and the program was under the direction of Mrs. R. P. Walker, chairman of patriotic education. The eleven boys who appeared on the program included representatives from the four high school grades. They spoke in an exceptional manner and made a splendid impression on the audience.

Mr. Walker had invited Mr. Noble Garrett, prominent merchant of Waynesville and winner of the first medal, twenty-four years ago, to present it to the winner on this occasion. Mrs. Walker presented the silver piece to Gordon Wyatt.

Dr. R. P. Walker, Mr. C. F. Kirkpatrick and Prof. W. C. Allen acted as judges of the contest.

East Waynesville P. T. A. met on Tuesday in celebration of the Thirty-sixth anniversary of Founders Day, which was the 17th of February. Mrs. Doyle Alley, president, presided.

The meeting was called to order and the entire audience stood for several minutes in silent respect to the memory of the late Judge Walter E. Moore, who had been present on several occasions in this school and had recently addressed the P. T. A. on citizenship and Standards of Education, to Mrs. Wright, a departed member of the P. T. A. and to Mr. J. L. Palmer, a departed patron of the school. Then followed the reading of the National Collect.

Reports were given from each committee. The Cafeteria chairman reported with the aid of the relief fund available through the Welfare Department, there has been an average of 17 children given free lunch each day in this school.

Room representatives gave interesting reports of activities, among which was the sewing which has been done for needy children in the school. Room representatives will sponsor a fund round-up of new members in order to meet necessary requirements. A picture or a book will be given to the room securing the most new paid members within the next four weeks. At present the membership numbers forty.

Wilburn assisting, was named to perfect plans for a social affair to raise funds for a nominating committee composed of Mrs. S. E. Conatser, Mrs. J. C. Ross and Mrs. Mary Reeves. Boston, chairman of program committee, had charge of the special feature of the program, which was giving a resume of the History of Founders Day from the bulletin and calling on the members present to voice the benefit, they had derived from being a member in the P. Mrs. Harbeck Given \$5,125 In Settlement Of A \$35,000 Suit

Clerk of the Court, W. G. Byers, has received from the F. W. Woolworth company, Asheville a check for \$5,125 in settlement of a judgment against the company which was given at the last session of superior court here in favor of Mrs. Lillie Harbeck. Mrs. Harbeck sustained serious injuries several months ago in stumbling over a coal weighing machine in front of the Woolworth store on Patton avenue, Asheville.

Mrs. Harbeck sued the Woolworth company for \$35,000, alleging neglect of the company in having the weighing machine in a dangerous situation where throngs of persons are hourly passing. In a hard fought legal battle here in January, this year, the jury awarded Mrs. Harbeck a verdict of \$6,000. The defendant company appealed to the Supreme Court. The appeal bond was fixed and the preparation of the appeal papers begun.

The company, however, proposed a settlement on the basis of \$5,125 damages and the payment of all court costs, which was accepted by Mrs. Harbeck, and the case is cleared from the docket.
