Waynesville P. T. A. Awarded Certificate

Waynesville Elementary Parent-Teacher Association was awarded a Standard Certificate at the State Association held in Greensboro, April 19, 20, and 21, this being the first Standard Certificate awarded to a Parent-Teacher Association in Waynesville township. The necessary requirements by the National Certificate Authority for other Associations for a Standard Parent-Teacher Association are as follows:

1. Membership: Monthly dues total at least 50% of the number of children in the school. 2. Attendance: A monthly average attendance of adults at the meetings of at least 40% of the total membership. 3. Committees: Standard committees include home, ex-committee, membership, program, publicity, home, finance, and budget, and public relations. 4. Program: A program and at least two other committees for activities of at least 30 members. 5. Committees: Functioning under the local executive committee.

6. Meetings: At least seven meetings held during the year. 7. Dues: State and national dues for each enrolled member sent by the head treasurer to the state treasurer and by the state treasurer to the national treasurer. 8. Publications: Use of Congress publications in the regular work of the association. Subscriptions to the "Well Welfare" magazine equal to 10% of the families in membership. 9. Partisanship: Freedom from political and sectarian partisanship and from promoting commercial enterprises. 10. Rules of Order: By-laws approved by the association.
