

Great Smoky Mountains National Park Is Wonderland For Lovers Of Nature

The Great Smoky Mountains National Park, a vast storehouse of primitive natural life, is a wonderland for the nature lovers among the thousands of visitors who are touring through this scenic, mountain playground, each year. Undisturbed since the days of colonial America, the larger portion of the park is virgin wilderness, containing an impressive large variety of wild life.

Within the bounds of the national park, it is said, are to be found more species and varieties of plant life than can be discovered on the whole of the continent of Europe. There are 152 varieties of trees alone. Of the 328,000 acres to be included in the national reservation, over 200,000 acres are covered with virgin timber, untouched by the lumberman, the last great eastern primitive wilderness.

Botanists have discovered in the Great Smokies, among other forms of plant life not only every other variety of trillium to be found in America, but also two new varieties, as yet unnamed. Flowers of every variety color the valleys and mountain slopes with a riot of color and profusion of blossoms, through the spring and summer and into the early autumn.

The great diversity of plant life as well as that of animal life in the Great Smokies, is said to be due to the great range of altitude within the national park and to the mid-southern location of the tract. As one ascends the mountains to the summit of the great central divide, climatic conditions change. In the valleys are flowers and trees indigenous to northern Georgia. On the summits of the higher ranges exists a forest which shelters plants and animals indigenous to southern Canada.

Black bears, deer, beavers, ravens and other species of animal and bird life, are to be found in the Smokies in varying numbers. Beavers and deer will be introduced in greater numbers and protected. Within the boundaries of the park entomologists have discovered a new species of air-breathing beetle, which has the strange faculty for living for months under water, without rising to the surface. This beetle is another of the wonders the Great Smokies offer for the study and enjoyment of scientists and nature lovers.

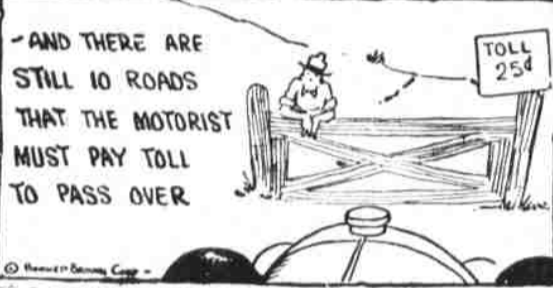
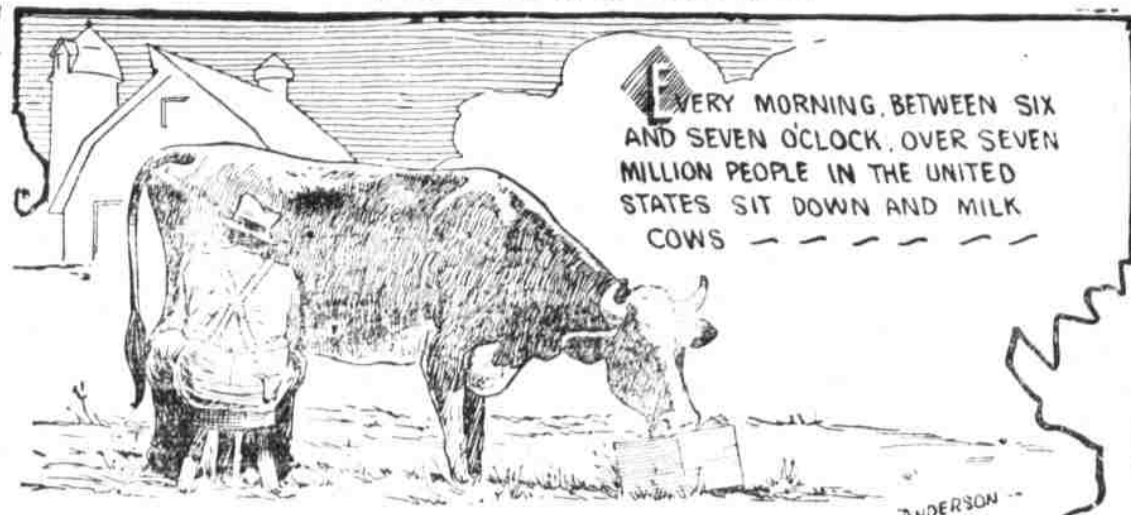

Judge Felix Alley Speaks To Bar On "The Ideal Lawyer"

Buncombe Bar Association Hears Waynesville Jurist Last Saturday Night.

Members of the Buncombe County Bar association last Saturday night at their monthly dinner meeting at the Battery Park hotel heard Judge Felix E. Alley, of Waynesville, discuss "The Ideal Lawyer."

"The ideal lawyer is one who has so thoroughly prepared and equipped himself that he can render a clear, careful, wholesome and prudent advice that will steer him away from litigation," Judge Alley began. "He will be able to prepare documents that will not require additional interpretation to the court and jury, and his legal phraseology will be such that he can clearly and correctly state his case in court."

"The ideal lawyer must be a master of the principles of philosophy as applied with the rules of common sense. He must be able to go into court and give the effort such assistance as will bring it to correct conclusions. He must go further and state his points, so concisely that the higher courts will have no doubts as to his honesty and ability, nor any question as to his case."

"The ideal lawyer never resorts to law and sordid appeals to sympathy, prejudice and hate. He recognizes that many members of juries are unlearned, inexperienced and impulsive. He knows they are easily swayed by clever or onslaughts of oratory, and will not use methods to unduly and erroneously influence them. He will endeavor to lift the jury out of all improper sentiment and feeling so that it can perceive the truth with unfettered will and reflect it in its verdict."

"Being honest with the court, is a point of the ideal lawyer. He will not undertake to deceive the court in any way. He will refuse to defend a position that is unsound and will not seek to induce the court to render a false judgment."

"The ideal lawyer is honest with his opponents. This does not mean he will at any time, nor reveal the sources of his information. But it does mean he will consider a lawsuit in a different light than a dog fight. He will recognize every lawsuit as a legal battle for justice."
