## SAYS TRUCK GROWERS NEED BETTER FERTILIZER

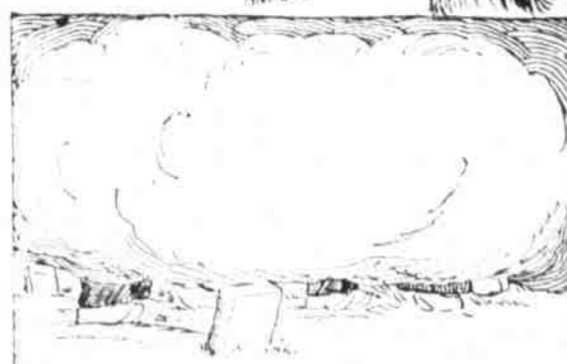
Certain soluble salts, consisting chiefly of chlorides or chlorine, will injure truck crops like sweet potatoes, cucumbers, cantaloupes, and artichoke grown on sandy soils during dry season and the fertilizer used for these crops should contain not more than five per cent of these chlorides when 1000 pounds or more of fertilizer are used per acre.

The new fertilizer law does not require manufacturers to give the contents of all the fertilizers sold for the season, that no method of chemical analysis can check the amounts of such ingredients used,"

says L. G. Willis, soil chemist at State College. "Therefore, the truck grower should use carefully the information he has available about the kind of materials to use with his crops especially where he distributes 1,000 or more pounds to the acre. In truck fertilizers there is considerable risk when the concentration of soluble salts is unnecessarily high. The salts found injurious most commonly are carried in low analysis of chlorides or chlorine."

Experimental work with tobacco has made it possible to prescribe fairly accurately the maximum amount of chloride that can be used without risk or damage, Willis says, but work with truck crops is not complete enough yet to allow such a limit to

## Use Native Fuel In Larger Industries

Industrial plants, along with home-owners and school officials have learned that wood is an excellent fuel and may be used with economy and effectiveness under present business conditions.

The experience of the Statesville Cotton Mills is a good example of this," says R. W. Graber, extension forester at State College. "This plant operates large boilers, fired in four units and designed for coal. They must have a minimum steam pressure of 110 pounds during the day but the mills have found it advantageous to turn to wood as fuel. For the past ten months these mills have been using wood with satisfaction and at a great saving. They began firing with wood to test the claim that the material could be used in industrial plants. The results were entirely satisfactory. In addition, they have spent considerable money locally thus aiding in the unemployment situation."

Mr. Graber says the Statesville plant has been using an average of 7 to 8 cords a day, consisting of a mixture of hardwood, mostly oak and hickory. One and one-half cords of this mixture has been equivalent to one ton of coal. This plant is paying \$2 a cord for wood against \$3.87 a ton for coal. The daily saving has been approximately \$4.00.

In planning to use wood for fuel, the Statesville organization first made an agreement with a group of farmers so that the fuel would be delivered regularly. The firm says he has no trouble in keeping the necessary head of steam.

Mr. Graber says that 50 million cords of wood could be removed from North Carolina woodlands by a proper system of thinning and cutting and that the remaining trees would be benefited by such a removal.

## Timely Questions And Answers On Farm Problems

Questions: When should dewberries be pruned to control cane blight?  
Answer: Experiments in the dewberry growing section show that best control is obtained when the old canes are pruned out immediately after harvest. This allows the new cane buds to develop more quickly and also removes the source of infection. The cutting of all old canes just above the crown has given best control and has not affected the yield to any great extent.

be set.  
However, truck grower, should see to it that the chloride content is not over 5 per cent when fertilizers are used at the rate of 1000 pounds to the acre. For tobacco, this content should not be above two per cent.

The cost of fertilizer guaranteeing the chloride content will be higher than ordinary mixture, but may be worth the difference. Mr. Willis says.

Cooperative selling of wool by farmers of Graham County gave them 9 to 15 cents more a pound than was being paid on the open market. The pooled wool sold for 25 cents, while outside buyers were offering from 19 to 16 cents a pound.

The cream routes, recently established in McDowell County, are affording farmers a cash market for much surplus milk and are also paying a good price for surplus roughage. More than 80 gallons of cream were shipped the second week.

Farmers of Rowan County have increased the yield of wheat from two to three hundred per cent this year by top dressing. On many farms the top dressing was the only fertilizer used on the crop, reports the county agent.

The curb market, established at Lenoir in Caldwell County eight months ago, is now selling over \$500.00 worth of farm produce each month. There are 21 families that sell each market day.

Dairy farmers of Person County are either trading allscrub and grade bulls for purebred animals or selling them for beef and will buy registered bull. County Agent Sanders reports that ten animals were placed last week.
