### Babies Who Cry Loudly Kill Bacteria In Food, Expert Says

If the baby could cry at a higher pitch he might make his own milk more digestible.

A study of the effect of sounds in causing chemical changes in milk and other substances, including making the proteins in milk more easily digestible, was reported today to the American Association for the Advancement of Science by Drs. E. W. Florsdorf and L. A. Chambers of the University of Pennsylvania Medical School.

Scientists have recently learned that bacteria in milk water, fruit juices and other liquids can be killed by "squeal" sounds of very high pitch.

Drs. Florsdorf and Chambers discovered they could produce chemical changes by sounds well within the range of human hearing. With their sound-making instruments they wrought a number of chemical reactions generally affected only by extremely high temperatures. They did so at ordinary room temperatures.

The coagulated proteins, such as albumen and casein. A hen's egg-rich in these substances, they reported, appeared to have been soft boiled under the noise treatment. From ethyl acetate, a substance similar to fats, they obtained acetic acid, found in ordinary vinegar. Various vegetable oils were "cracked" to yield acetylene gas.

### Over 1,200,000 Men Return To Work

Washington.—William Green, president of the American Federation of Labor, said tonight that more than 1,200,000 men had gone back to work since March.

Figures published earlier today by the federation estimated the return to work during April at 629,000, but Green said this should be raised to 735,000 and added that 495,000 had been re-employed during May.

"The employment gain in April, due as it was to the rebound from crisis," he said, "could not be taken as indicating an upward trend. Now that gains have continued for a second month there is more reason to believe that foundations for an upward trend may be formed."

March, 1933, 13,770,000.  
April, 1933, 13,035,000.  
May, 1933, 12,450,000.

### NAVY IS ASKING FOR 290 PLANES

A new batch of 290 fighting planes is wanted by the navy to supplement the \$238,000,000 three-year ship-building program.

This proposal would take \$9,362,000 of the industrial control act's public work funds. In addition, the navy would like \$5,900,000 for planes to fill the places in the five-year program of those assigned to the eight-inch gun cruisers and the new aircraft carrier, Ranger.

The navy's present plane strength hovers around the 1000 mark, but Rear Admiral Ernest King, chief of naval aeronautics, said June 16 the 32 ships in the new program will require 290 additional planes. Construction of the new planes would be spread over a three-year period, depending on times of completing the ships.
