

\$358,579 In Sales Tax Paid To State During Past Month

Beer Tax Amounts To \$39,930. Total of \$2,045,736 Collected in August.

The State of North Carolina collected from the general sales tax for the month of August and for the year to date, according to Commissioner Revenue Maxwell.

The total revenue for the month of August was \$2,045,736 as compared with \$1,975,000 for the same month of 1932.

The total tax for July and August amounts to \$78,930.

The total for gasoline and motor taxes show a total of \$1,545,000 for August as compared with \$1,500,000 for the same month of 1932.

The statement issued by Commissioner Maxwell with regard to these figures is as follows:

The August revenue collections for general and highway funds are regarded as satisfactory. General fund collections require some explanatory comments. There is an important change in August collections of corporation franchise taxes as compared with August of last year. This is due to the fact that this is the assessment year and does not represent an actual shrinkage in revenues. Eliminating this temporary feature there is an average increase in general fund collections, without the new sales tax revenue.

There are many factors which make the first month's collections of sales tax substantially less than will be realized from its subsequent months. Payment of the tax was made in August by 11,707 merchants based on July sales. Tax sales made in July will be included in subsequent months as they are paid. There has been a 7.71 per cent registration under the act of 1931 and several thousand more will yet be added to this list. All of these whose tax is less than \$10 per month are only required to make quarterly reports.

The departmental estimate is that final collections on July sales will approximate \$550,000 and that this amount will be heavily increased for other trading months to approximate the total annual estimate of \$8,000,000 a year.

The total registration under the act indicates a very satisfactory activity on the part of the enlarged field organization.
