The state is represented by Solicitor John M. Queen, George C. Davis and Lee Davis.
Queen enters request of state as follows:
The Southern entered a plea of guilty of second degree murder of the slain Will Southland. He was sentenced 5 to 7 years at the state penitentiary.
Ed Bigham entered a plea of guilty of a man with deadly weapon on Mrs. Joe Bingham, and a jury found Wade Hopkins guilty of aiding and abetting in the same case. Sentence will be passed on the defendants Friday.

Joe Thompson and Willis Rector, distilling fine of \$25 and costs.
Frank Nichols, breaking and entering filling station—sentenced 5 years in state penitentiary. Defendant was also sentenced 90 days to be served after above term for larceny.

Eddie Watson, larceny and receiving—sentenced on road for 18 months.
Eugene Watson, larceny and receiving—sentenced 18 months on road.

Blalock Given 5 To 10 Years For Slaying Tye Cathey In 1932

By agreement a verdict of manslaughter was rendered Friday morning in Superior Court here in the case against Sam Blalock, charged with the murder of Tye Cathey in December, 1932.

The agreement, a verdict of not guilty was rendered as to Claude Sams, who with Blalock was named with the slaying of Cathey by Judge T. B. Finley presiding, sentenced Blalock to serve from ten years in State's prison to be worked at any labor he is able to do.

Following the verdict as to the he was released from custody. The agreement in the case reached after a conference of counsel on both sides, the judge and Judge Finley. The conference was held before court on the morning session.
