Timely Questions And Answers On Farm Problems

Question: Can skim milk or buttermilk be substituted for any other ingredient in the poultry laying mash?

Answer: Skim milk (clabber) or buttermilk make a good substitute for fish meal, meat meal or fish meal. Four and one-half gallons can be used as a substitute for all milk products, meat meal and fish meal in the mash for 100 hens. The success of this substitution, however, will depend upon the regularity of feeding. Unless there is an ample supply for continuous feeding of the skim milk or buttermilk, no substitution should be made.

Question: What benefit payments are provided for burley tobacco growers under the reduction contract?

Answer: For each acre taken out of production a rental payment of \$20.00 an acre will be made. Two adjustment payments will also be made. The first will be not less than 10 per cent of the net sale value of the 1933 crop provided this is not less than 15 per cent of the net value of the 1933 crop if it is reduced 50 per cent in 1934. The second adjustment payment will be not less than 15 per cent of the net sale value of the 1934 crop for a 33 1/3 reduction and 35 per cent of the net value for a 50 per cent reduction.

Question: What causes my dairy cows to eat dirt or chew on wood and bones?

Answer: This habit shows that the animal is not getting the right kind and that the ration is deficient in mineral matter. This element is supplied by legume hays, such as cow peas, soybeans, vetch and alfalfa when grown on lands not deficient in lime and by a grain ration that contains as much as 20 per cent of wheat bran, crushed meal, and soybean meal. It is a habit to this ration about two parts of mineral mixture containing equal parts of linseed meal, limestone and 100 pounds of ground iron should be added to each 100 pounds of concentrate. Cows and young cattle should have access to a simple mixture composed of one part of salt to five parts of steamed bone meal.

Question: How can winter injury of peach and apple trees be prevented?

Answer: A mound of earth thrown around the base will to some extent prevent serious injury. In many orchards, however, this injury extends to the trunk and must be controlled by wrapping the trunk with paper. Old newspapers or wrapping paper may be used. Where the bark is cracked or otherwise injured the paper should be wrapped around the trunk and tied so as to protect the injury from winter freezes. The mound about the base will also protect the tree from injury by field mice.
