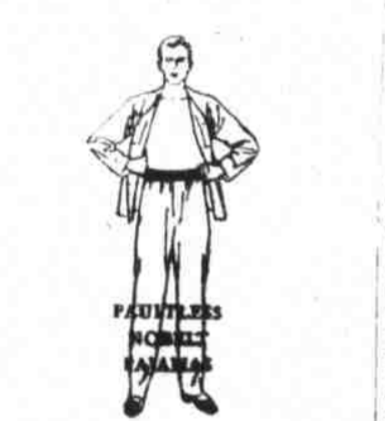

of the schools, the church and the character of its child. And when the home fails to do its part the responsibility of the teacher becomes greater.

The teacher has a great part in the shaping and the building of the character of the child that he teaches by his acts, deeds, and conduct before the child. The child is always watching its character.

I know of no profession that demands honest, truthful, upright and God fearing men and women more than the teaching profession. Your responsibility is great, because the character of the child in a large measure will possess many of the qualities that go to make your character.

The child's surroundings affect his education. Everything that he comes in contact with affects him: his home, his school, the community and also the moral atmosphere which surrounds him.

We are committed in this country to the principles that the public school cannot teach religion, but this by no means relieves it of the responsibility of moral character.

The school reaches all of the children and has the opportunity of helping the child. Character comes from a character education; this being true, the home and the community should join hands with the school in helping the child.
