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### Expect 90 Per Cent Of Burley Growers To Sign Contracts

(Special to The Mountaineer) College Station, Raleigh.—Approximately 90 per cent of the burley to tobacco growers in Western North Carolina are expected to sign acreage reduction contracts...

Mr. McCarty who has recently returned from a trip to the western part of the state said that the only thing standing in the way of a rapid sign-up is the lack of facilities for explaining the contracts to the growers...

Many of the burley growers have less than a quarter acre in tobacco cultivation, he said. He pointed out that a grower with one-eighth of an acre in cultivation, producing at an average rate of 300 pounds to the acre would receive approximately \$2.00 for reducing one-third, or \$1.70 if he reduces one-half.
