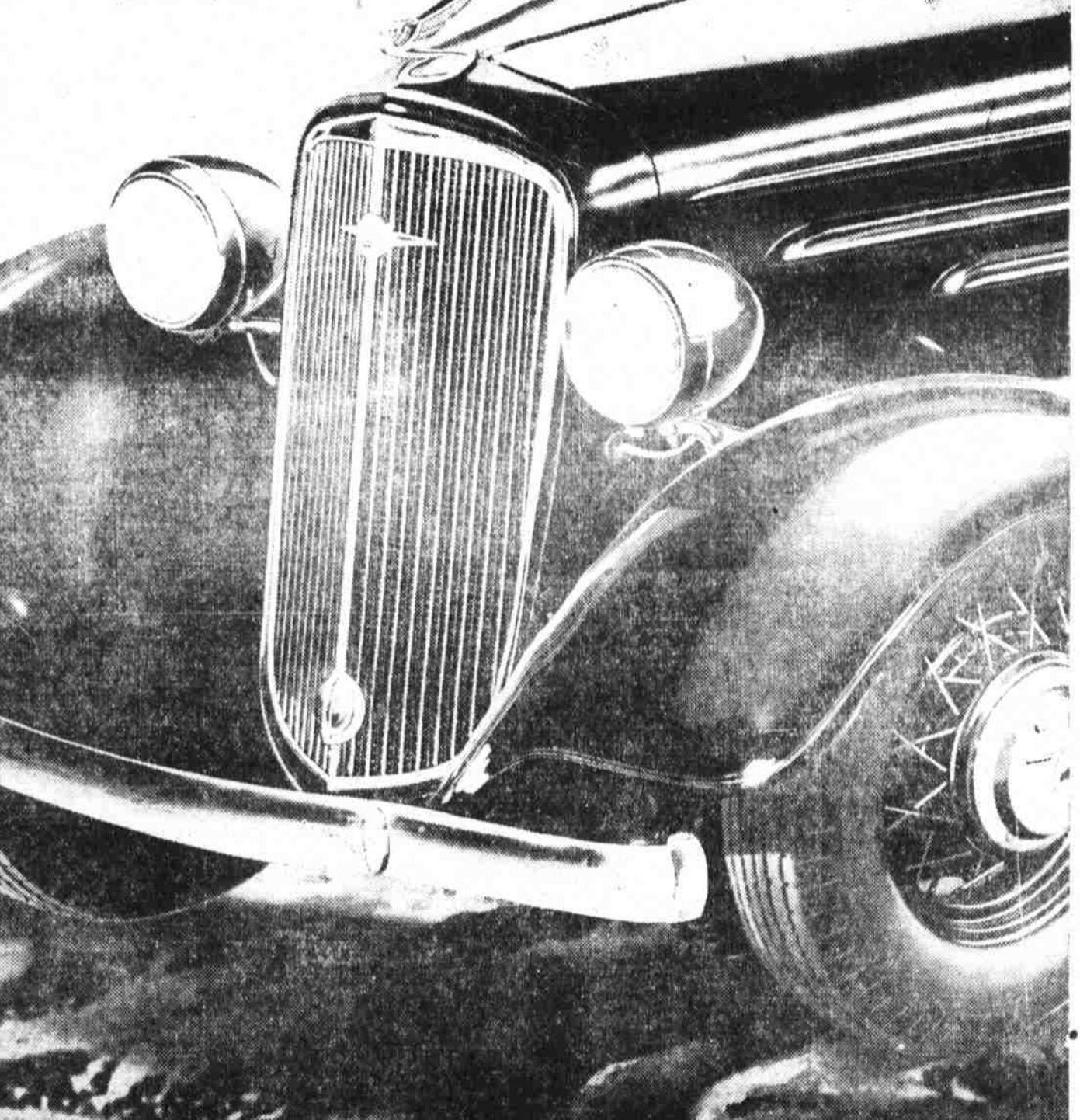
Tax Collections Criticism Met By State Officials

Raleigh, those who are actively opposing the 2 per cent sales tax of retail sales are being merchants over the state the department of revenue is paying its field deputies a minimum salary of \$175 a month just to check up on the sales tax alone a merchant from Laurel Hill in Scotland county told Director Harry McMullan of the collections division of the department one day this week, and asked for accurate information.
 Here is what Director McMullan told the merchant:
 The department of revenue has 62 field deputy collectors who not only check up on and collect the sales tax, but also enforce tax against other state taxes with the exception of the inheritance tax, 95 per cent of their time is devoted to the sales tax.
 These deputy collectors receive only \$175 to \$225 a month in salary. Those who have previously been in the department getting a much less salary. Now some in a year the deputy collector's minimum salary.

The cost of collecting the sales tax is limited in the law to not more than 2 per cent of collections and so far the cost of collection, including the expenditure of the field force and of the files here, has been considerably less than this 2 per cent.
 "The amount of the salaries paid to all employees in either the collection division or any other division of the department of revenue is of public record and can be learned by any one at any time," McMullan said. "We are glad to give any one any information about salaries and collection costs at any time. As a result, we think it rather unfair for those who are opposing the sales tax to misrepresent the facts and to tell merchants that we are paying high salaries that we really are, and that our field deputies devote their entire time to collecting the sales tax, when they collect all the other taxes as well."
