N ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF SIX THOUSAND THREE HUNDRED DOLLARS (\$6,300.00) REFUNDING BOND OF THE TOWN OF HAZELWOOD, NORTH CAROLINA.

The Board of Trustees to the Municipal Finance Act of North Carolina, in whose name or the Town of Hazelwood, has hereby authorized to be paid to the purpose of refunding of the time of payment of a certain valid bonded indebtedness of the Town of Hazelwood in addition to July 1st, 1934, and the said indebtedness will be paid during the years 1934 and 1935 in evidence, of which indebtedness is to be cancelled prior to or at its maturity and simultaneously with the issuance of the bonds to refund such debt. The indebtedness hereby released was created for necessary expenses and for special purposes in strict compliance with the provisions of the Municipal Finance Act and decrees of the General Assembly of the State of North Carolina in force at the time of the issuance of said bonds, which indebtedness is more particularly described as follows:

Town of Hazelwood, North Carolina Street Improvement .6% Bonds, dated March 1st, 1926, due March 1st, 1934, \$3,000.

Town of Hazelwood, North Carolina Street Improvement .6% Bonds, dated March 1st, 1926, due March 1st, 1935, \$3,000.

Town of Hazelwood, North Carolina Street Improvement .6% Bonds, dated May 1st, 1923, due May 1st, 1935, \$1,000.

Town of Hazelwood, North Carolina Water .6% bonds, dated May 1st, 1923, due May 1st, 1934, \$500.

Town of Hazelwood, North Carolina Water .6% bonds, dated May 1st, 1925, due May 1st, 1935, \$500.

Total amount \$9,000.

Section 2. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the remaining bonds hereby authorized shall be annually levied and collected during each year that any of said bonds are outstanding and unpaid.

Section 3. A statement of the debt of the Town of Hazelwood has been filed with the Clerk of said Town and open to public inspection.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage and shall not be submitted to the voters of said town.

Upon motion of Mr. Richeson seconded by Mr. Fisher, the foregoing ordinance was adopted by the following call, to-wit: Mayor J. P. Scott, Alderman Richeson, Fisher, and Prevost.

Aldermen voting in favor of said ordinance are as follows: Richeson, Fisher, and Prevost.

No alderman voting against said ordinance.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 6th day of February, 1934, and was first published on the 8th day of February, 1934.

An action or proceeding questioning the validity of said bonds must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
