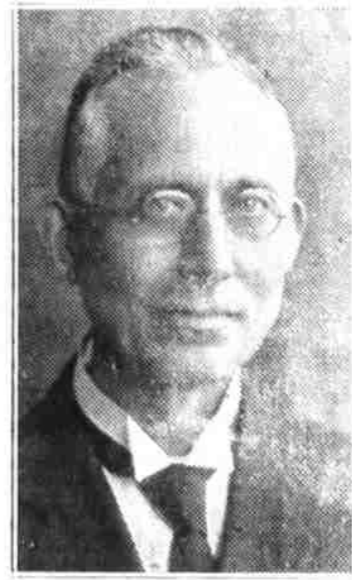
Belle Meade To Open May Fifth
