The Haywood County Hospital

The Haywood County Hospital is a modern institution providing medical care for the community. It is staffed by a team of dedicated professionals and offers a wide range of services.

When the late James B. Duke, shortly before his death, signed the endowment making possible the Duke Endowment, he did more than any other man has done toward alleviating the sick and suffering of the masses of North and South Carolina. As a result of his generosity, the Duke Endowment is now a source of financial aid for the hospital.

STATISTICAL AND FINANCIAL DATA

The following figures have been compiled covering the past six years:

There has been admitted to the hospital 4,720 patients.

To these patients the nurses and doctors have administered 58,040 days of care.

There have been 1,500 out-patients. That is patients not admitted as bed patients, but admitted for temporary treatment such as dressings, X-rays, etc.

257 babies have been born in the hospital.

755 patients admitted were children between the ages of one month and 14 years.

It is interesting to note that the number of persons receiving treatment during the period will number approximately 23% of the number of the entire population of the county.
