Public Appearance Of Soco Gap Band Saturday To Be One Feature Of Sales Event

Generally every merchant in Waynesville is taking part in the two Bargain Days which will be Friday and Saturday of this week. The advertising columns of this paper present in message and give some of the places of business at the same time.

## Haywood Summer School Students To Enroll On 7th

Cost To Teachers Of This County Is Only \$8 This Year. Dr. Garber To Be Director

Announcement was made yesterday by Jack Messer, superintendent of schools, that Haywood county teachers were scheduled to register for the summer school which will be held at Lake Junaluska this summer on Thursday, June 7, at nine o'clock at the Administration Building.

The tuition fee for Haywood teachers is six dollars, with a two dollar fee for library and recreation.

Mr. Messer stated that there had been some doubt as to what courses would be offered, and in order to clear this up, Dr. Paul Garber, director of the school, will meet all those wanting to discuss that phase of the work on Wednesday afternoon, June 6th, at the Mission building.

"We are anxious for every teacher that can to attend the summer school," Mr. Messer said.

## Survey Is Being Made In County On Child Welfare

In connection with the campaign that is being sponsored by the National Child Welfare Committee of the American Legion and the state departments of the American Legion and Auxiliary, Ruth Williams Rotha, together with assistance of a committee, has started a survey of this county to make a census and to ascertain the needs of the cases.

The purpose is to make a complete census of minor children of World War veterans and other citizens who are in distress; orphans of World War veterans and other citizens; and all children who are handicapped by physical disability, including the crippled and the uncared for, the deaf, blind and dumb.

The work is being handled through committees in different communities who are co-operating with Mrs. Rotha in completing the census. The Waynesville committee is composed of Mrs. Eli McGee and Mrs. J. C. Patrick.

## Stock And Acreage For Cannery Must Be Subscribed By Saturday

"We must have \$5,500 in the bank by Saturday, June the second, and the hundred acres contracted to be planted in tomatoes if we are to get the cannery here this year," County Agent W. D. Smith told The Mountaineer this week.

Several committees are out working in the county this week, and reports coming in from them indicate that the project will materialize and become a reality.

One hundred and fifty common stock holders at ten dollars each, and the remaining four thousand dollars will be preferred stock. As soon after Saturday as it is decided whether or not the money and the acreage is available, the charter will be prepared.

"While we have the assurance of

the assistance of Mr. Barr, cannery expert to supervise the work, it seems that we can't afford to miss such an opportunity in getting the cannery here," Mr. Smith said.

"The summer camps that are already established here together with the C. C. Camps, we have now an outlet sufficient to consume all our output right here within our own gates. And if the park is going to mean what all indications point that it will, then for our supply here will not near take care of the demand."

"The people of Haywood can't fail offered us in the way of a cannery at this time, and I urge everyone to do their part in seeing that both money and acreage is taken care of before Saturday," he concluded.

Store Building Now Occupied By Home Grocery To Be Remodeled and Used As Department Store

With weather permitting, workmen will begin next week in grading the back of the lot on which the J. C. Rose Grocery now stands preparatory to remodeling the front of the store which was sold this week to W. H. Burgin, F. A. Burgin, Otis Burgin and Mrs. Gladys Burgin.

The store will have a new front and will be remodeled inside. This work will begin in the near future, the new owners said yesterday. As soon as the work is complete they plan to open with a new line of merchandise featuring a general department store including ready-to-wear shoes and groceries and meats.

The new establishment will not be connected with the present firm of Burgin Bros., it was announced.

The building was formerly owned by W. J. Brown. In the deal, the building across from the depot next to Hyatt and Company was included, and which Mr. Bradlock has already assumed ownership.

The lot back of the store will be used as a parking space for the convenience of customers of the new business, it was said.

J. C. Rose, present occupant of the store, had no announcement to make regarding where he intended moving.

Haywood County Tournament Is Being Sponsored By Local Rotary Club

Interest of golfers next week will center in the Haywood County Golf Tournament which will be held at the Waynesville Country Club June 3 to 7. This year the Waynesville Rotary Club will present the top flight prize—The Rotary Trophy Cup, which will be on display at the club house Sunday.

Qualifying rounds will be played Sunday and Monday, June 3 and 4 and all golfers wishing to enter the tournament must turn in their qualifying score cards by Monday evening. Players having the eight lowest qualifying scores will compose the championship flight. A second and possibly a third flight will be arranged according to the number of players entering the tournament.

The winner of the championship flight match play will be presented the Rotary Trophy Cup which he may keep for one year. A player winning the tournament three years in succession will have permanent possession of the cup.
