State Wide Child Survey Arouses Interest Of Public

Mrs. W. M. Roth, a representative of the State Wide Child Welfare Survey, is in the city, and is expected to result in the recording of the status of every needy, blind, deaf, or crippled child in the state, the listing of every World War orphan, and the recording of every child who is eligible to receive help from the National Child Welfare Endowment fund of more than \$5,000,000.
