Clark Frady Gets 12 To 15 Years For Slaying M. West

Defendant Submits To Charge Of Second Degree Murder. Number of Cases Disposed

The only major case scheduled for the July term of court was disposed of Tuesday, when Clark Frady submitted to a charge of second degree murder for the slaying of Monroe West in Cecil township last March.

Solicitor John M. Queen accepted the plea and Frady was sentenced by Judge J. Will Pless, Jr. to serve from 12 to 15 years at hard labor, after a plea for mercy had been made by Grover C. Davis, attorney for the defendant.

The state's witnesses, among them the widow of the slain man, all practically agreed upon the main points that the two men had quarreled about some liquor that had been purchased between them, and after the quarrel left the home of Monroe West together, supposedly to settle the matter with a fight. Later, Frady came back with a rifle, and in the meantime West had also returned but left again. Frady had left his rifle in the out-of-the-house.

After being in the home in West for some time, Frady again left and a short time after ward the report of a rifle was heard and West's body was found in the road some distance from the house. Evidence further showed that Frady the next morning submitted himself to the sheriff with a statement that he had slain Monroe West with a rifle, but that he was unable to save the rifle.

Tuesday there were 15 men busy on the construction part of the building, and several were engaged in installing the plumbing system. The building is made of steel metal, with a corrugated iron roof, 24 windows and copper door casings, and make up the side walls.
