Two Portions Of Pakway Approved By Secretary Ickes

that part from Swift Run Gap to Jacmani's Gap. Secretary Ickes called attention to the difference between a parkway and a highway. Along a parkway there are restricted frontage rights, with no refreshment stands and the like, except at certain turnoffs. The motorist can ride along at ease and enjoy the scenery without having to worry about coming to crossroads, people backing their cars out of lanes and what he has to do on a highway. He said that the Shenandoah-Great Smoky Mountains parkway will be developed with numerous parking spaces where the traveler may leave his car and get out for a better view of the especially interesting features. It is pointed out that the scenic area along the route will be built to some of the important scenic attractions along the route. The two areas which this parkway will connect are not as yet national parks in the fullest sense of the word. While the Great Smoky Mountains parkway is being administered by the National Park Service, according to law it cannot be developed until a minimum of 400,000 acres has been turned over by the states to the Federal government. It is hoped this minimum area soon may be secured. The Shenandoah is expected to take on parkhood in a few months, when a deed covering practically the entire park, out of 165,000 acres will be turned to Uncle Sam. These two national parks, containing spectacular mountain scenery with the beautiful parkway connecting them, will provide a superb scenic and recreational area for the people in the congested cities of the East.—Raleigh News and Observer.
