## Man Who Built First Telephone Line In City On Visit Here

J. E. Hellams, a former citizen of Waynesville, but now living in Oklahoma, was for some days a visitor here last week. He left here thirty-eight years ago, and this is his first visit since leaving. He started some peep-holes Saturday by saying that he built the first telephone line ever installed in Waynesville. He said also that he and W. L. Elias put up the first photograph gallery in Waynesville.

Mr. Hellams, who lives now at 12 North Roberson Avenue, Oklahoma City, left here in 1898, and has not been back to the town since that date until his visit some days ago. He said that the change in the town has been great, but there are familiar places still here when he remembered very well.

He said that he built practically all of the first telephone line himself. It was about 1893, he said, and he had practically all of the work myself. It was an independent and cooperative line confined entirely to the town of Waynesville. We had fifty patrons and charged each one \$1.50 a month. Each subscriber was also a stockholder as he paid for building his line to his home and also owned his telephone instrument. He exhibited some of his old bills that had been made out in 1896 for telephone toll. He said that he had brought them along as souvenirs and to collect if it should happen to run out of money while here.

Among other activities he was engaged in while here, he said that he and W. L. Elias worked an insulator for a time near the railroad depot and opened a photograph studio in the old Sawyer building on Main street. The telephone exchange was in one part.

Mr. Hellams is now engaged in getting up the genealogy of the Rolling family, and tracing the ancestry of the families who are descended from the Indian Maiden Pochontas.

## Italian Is Granted A Permit to Hang

Sordivolo, Italy.—One of the most unusual permits ever granted by the constituted authorities allows Domenico Otella, of this town, a butcher and sometimes an actor, to hang himself.

He may do so whenever and as often as he pleases. His announced intention is to make immediate use of the authority by suspending himself from the limb of a tree.

Domenico has hanged himself many times without harmful results. But whereas in the past he has been able to remain hanging only five minutes he believes now he can lengthen that period to ten.

Achievement of such a feat however requires practice and it is for that purpose Domenico obtained the permit.

He takes the part of Judas in the annual passion play given here. Once yearly for more than two decades audiences have applauded while he dangled from a tree.

Inhabitants of Sordivolo have long since ceased to be alarmed when Domenico casually suspended himself in the neighborhood, but when two small boys proceeded to decapitate a limb in an apple orchard in nearby Sordivolo they dashed in enough town to arouse the mayor. The children, shocked to the point of finding him hanging for a second day. They brought him down by their force, exchanged meaning glances over his explanation, then telegraphed his parents to come immediately.

For some time something tragic had happened, they came, but they found that their son had merely been hanging himself. Thereupon they accompanied him to the village authorities and obtained the permit whereby Domenico, without interference from the public, may hang to his heart's content.

**U. S. Annexations**  
Nearly a third of the territory of the continental United States was once a part of Mexico. It was acquired by the United States in three annexations. The first was when Texas, which had rebelled from Mexico and set up a separate government, was annexed to this country in 1845. The question of the Texas boundary led to the Mexican war, at the conclusion of which our southern neighbor ceded everything north of the Rio Grande and Gila rivers. In 1853 this country settled a number of questions of boundary, property and damages by purchasing an additional strip of southwestern land from Mexico—the Gadsden purchase. Included in these three acquisitions were all of the states of Texas, New Mexico, Arizona, Utah, Nevada and California, more than half of Colorado and parts of Oklahoma, Kansas and Wyoming.

**Strange Monkeys**  
Probably the strangest monkey is the proboscis monkey with its long flat nose which it uses as a lever to hunt for insects under the bark of rotting trees. When the nose has lifted up the bark the mouth is close by to gobble up whatever food is present. Another odd looking member of this family is the heart nosed monkey, so named from the heart shape of its schnozzle. Two mutton chop effects of lighter fur coming down from the eyes and toward the upper part of the jaws add to its weird appearance.
