Washington NOTES

TAX SUITS - Seventeen suits have been instituted against firms alleged to have participated in the diversion of tax dollars from industrial to beverage producing prohibition and the government hopes to collect \$22,000,000 in back taxes.

SHRINKS - The once mighty American whaling fleet of 1,000 vessels has shrunk to 14 according to the Department of Commerce.

SENATE DESKS - The Senate desks have been arranged so that the two parties will continue to be separated by the aisle. At first it was thought that some Democrats would have to sit on the side of the opposite party but, after consultation, the desks on the Democratic side were squeezed closer together and a new rear row of seats was made, making five rows and 69 seats in all, only three rows of nine seats each were separated, and all on the minority side.

ROOSEVELT BROADCAST - Another interesting point to the American people will be broadcast by President Roosevelt in December. It is expected that the President will discuss agricultural and relief programs, with probably some explanation of the budget problem.

MOONEY'S PLEA - Thomas J. Mooney's fight for liberty would be forwarded when the supreme court directed prison officials to show cause why a writ of habeas corpus should not issue in his case.

FOR AIRSHIPS - The prompt construction of two giant airships has been recommended to the President's aviation commission by Chairman Vinson of the House Naval Affairs Committee.

HOMES AT NORRIS - The unit cost for houses at Norris, Tennessee, constructed to accommodate the families of workers constructing the Norris Dam, ranged from \$2,285 to \$6,365.

HOLD-UP - After a disbursement of about \$2,000,000 and with its remaining \$1,200,000, the Home Owners Loan Corporation is now receiving more applications. It has refinanced mortgages on \$30,000,000.

EMPLOYMENT - PWA employment is adding 7,200,000 persons according to Secretary Tamm, who says that two million of these are directly employed and the others indirectly.

URGENT ARMS CONTROL - Secretary Hull discloses that the United States is urging the principal arms manufacturing countries to agree to some effective control over such traffic.

PRIVATE BUILDING - Private building efforts are being pushed by James A. Moffatt, administrator of the Federal Housing Act, who hopes to show a marked upturn by spring in order to avert another huge Federal building outlay.

ROOSEVELT AWAY - President Roosevelt will be away from Washington for about two more weeks in connection with his inspection tour of the Tennessee Valley work and a short visit to Warm Springs, Georgia.

NEUTRAL - The President is said to be entirely neutral in the race of individual Democrats for the speakership. Last week the chances of Representative Sam Rayburn, of Texas were improved by the withdrawal of Representative Marvin Jones, of the same state.
