Playing in a field of mud the fighting team of Waynesville High added another victory to the winning side of their record by the score of 39 to 13. Bridges, triple threat back, drove, passed and kicked his team to another victory as he played his last game Turkey Day. "Yank" return of a Marion kick, his scoring, and passing were outstanding features of the game. Hyatt, Ross and Reeves made some beautiful catches and runs for nice gains.

Early in the opening period Bridges Summerow and Reeves worked the ball to the 2 yard line where Bridges made the first score. Summerow passed to Yount for the extra point. In a few minutes Captain Ross played the ball on the one yard line after taking a 15 yard pass from Summerow and in the second quarter Coach Weatherly sent in his reserves and Broom and Hunt made seven points for Marion. A few minutes later Broom, sensational back, flipped a pass to Miller for six more points to tie the score, 13-13 at the half ended.

Passes to Ross and Yount from Bridges and a drive by "Yank" was good for a score in a few minutes of play in the second half. Bridges added the extra point through the line.

On the next play Ross blocked a punt and Hyatt fell on the ball. Then Summerow passed to Yount for a touchdown. Reeves added the extra point through the line.

Passes from Bridges to Summerow placed the ball on Marion's one yard line. Summerow drove the line for the score on the first play of the third period.

At the beginning of the fourth quarter Summerow passed to Ross for another touchdown and Reeves added the final point of the game. The score: Mountaineers 39, Marion, 13.

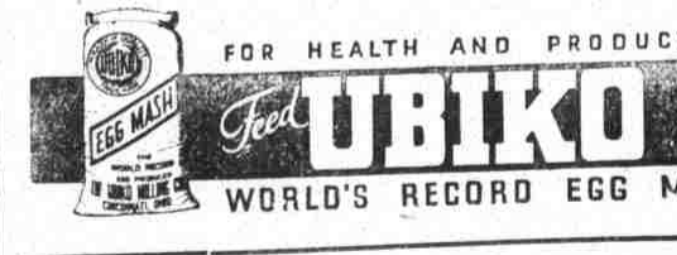
