President Roosevelt in his budget message requests \$8,520,413,609 for the fiscal year 1936, including a lump appropriation of about four billion dollars to be spent virtually as he pleases. This would mean a deficit of four and a half billion dollars for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1936, and an increase of 3 bil-lion in the national debt, bringing it to a new high record of \$34,239,000, 000. The President did not speculate upon a balanced budget except to point out that such deficit as occurs in 1936 would be due to expenditures to give work to unemployed, and that these would decline "as rapidly as private industry" is able to reemploy those now out of work

For national defense the budget requests \$489,871,347 for the navy department and \$381,050.945 for the war department. These figures represent increases of \$189,853,499 and \$319,536,523 respectively. Non-military activities of the army, under the Corps of Engineers, were allowed \$50,330,926.
