THE NRA AND AAA STUDIED FARLEY TELLS OF MAIL ARGUE GOLD CLAUSE ARMY GETS INCREASE NAVY TO BUILD SHIPS

By Hugo Sims, The Mountaineer's Special Washington Correspondent. Some time ago Secretary Wallace had his economic advisor on finance, Gardiner C. Means, to make a study of the NRA and the AAA with a view to clearly understanding the conflicting policies of these emergency agencies. Although intended for private study the report will become a public document in pursuance to a Senate resolution introduced by Senator Borah.

Postmaster General Farley expressed the hope that his next annual report will describe transatlantic air transport service, and calls attention to the fact that plans for a transatlantic air service have further advanced. He says that reduction of the air mail postage rate has produced an increasing volume of air mail, that the service now includes more mileage and cities than ever before and that a result of canceling the former contracts the average rate of pay per mile is 26.802 compared with an average of 4 1/2 a mile prior to annulling the contracts.

He insists that the 3c letter mail rate must be continued to prevent a loss of 75 million dollars per year in revenue. Referring to the debated postal surplus of \$12,161,015 for 1934, Mr. Farley says that this compares with deficits ranging from 48 million to 143 million for the previous four years, and that these amounts were arrived at after adjustments for non-postal items authorized by law. These include the air mail subsidy, the ocean mail subsidy, franked and penalty mail.

President Roosevelt in his budget message requests \$8,520,413,609 for the fiscal year 1935, including a lump appropriation of about four billion dollars to be spent virtually as he pleases. This would mean a deficit of four and a half billion dollars for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1936, and an increase of 3 billion in the national debt, bringing it to a new high record of \$34,239,000,000. For ordinary expenses the budget is \$3,301,968,125, to which must be added statutory debt retirements of at least \$634,434,000. For emergency purposes \$4110,011,

475 is for general uses, and \$472,000,000 for the AAA. The estimated revenue is expected to be somewhat more than the ordinary expense of the government for the year.

The President did not speculate upon a balanced budget except to point out that such deficit as occurs in 1935 would be due to expenditures to give work to unemployed, and that these would decline "as rapidly as private industry" is able to reemploy those now out of work.

For national defense the budget requests \$189,871,347 for the navy department and \$381,050,945 for the war department. These figures represent increases of \$189,833,490 and \$39,595,523 respectively. Non-military activities of the army, under the Corps of Engineers, were allowed \$50,330,926.

Practically every army branch received an increase. The army will have 12,000,828 warrant officers, 118,750 enlisted men and 6,415 Philippine scouts. The Air Corps received half of the increased army appropriation, and will purchase 547 new planes during the year, which will give it 1,452 machines, practically all of which will be less than two years of age. Reserve organizations fared well, the National Guard getting \$30,812,798 and the organized reserve \$5,617,674—both being increased more than \$1,200,000. The Reserve Officers Training Corps gets \$3,323,246, a slight increase and the Citizens Military Training Camps about the same as last year.

The navy would be given 11,000 additional men, bringing the total strength to 93,500 to provide personnel for vessels under construction. \$22,500,000 is provided for new aircraft. \$12,500,000 for planes for new carriers and \$140,000,000 for the construction of naval vessels. This includes \$48,000,000 to complete vessels authorized before 1929, \$60,000,000 to continue work on twenty vessels started in the present fiscal year, and \$32,000,000 to begin twenty-four vessels during the 1935 fiscal year. These new ships will include a 14,500 ton air craft carrier, two six-inch gun cruisers, 3 destroyers, and 6 submarines. For maintenance and operating purposes the 1935 estimate amounts to \$208,689,096.

The reader should of course understand that the items and amounts set forth above are the requests contained in the budget which may or may not be appropriated by Congress. The changes are, however, that most of them will be in line with the estimates.

TREASURY PLANS

The Treasury plans to complete its 1935 borrowing within the next six months. It expects to need \$4,606,059,450 in new money and to carry out a number of refunding operations. At this time the Treasury has a nice balance of slightly more than two and one-half billion dollars. This includes the nine hundred million profit from gold and silver legislation but this, according to the President, will "not be touched."

SCORES TOWNSEND PLAN

Miss Frances Perkins, Secretary of Labor, says that the Townsend Plan to pay pensions of \$200 per month to persons sixty years of age and over would give to 9 per cent of the population more than half the entire income of the country.

FIGURES

President Roosevelt estimates that the Treasury will collect 43 cents for every dollar it spends this year, and 47 cents next year. The deficit will be \$4,869,000,000 this year and \$4,528,000,000 next year.

MONEY BILL
