July 22—Reciprocity treaty between the United States and Trinidad, Barbadoe, Bermuda, Jamaica and British Guiana signed at Washington, 1898; Maiden voyage of U. S. Constitution, 1793; Pilgrims leave for America, 1620.

July 23—U. S. Grant died, 1885; Dingley tariff law went into effect at midnight, 1890; Texas defeated state wide prohibition by 6,000 majority, 1911; Bunker Hill monument completed, 1841.

July 24—Ship "Eastland" sinks (Chicago) 812 drowned, 1915; Marathon race at Olympic games won by American athlete, Hayes, 1908; Great Salt Lake valley in Utah, entered by Brigham Young and his Mormon followers, and Salt Lake founded, 1847.

July 25—Officers of American exploring expedition to Fiji islands massacred by natives, 1840; First United States Bank established, 1791.

July 26—First Post Office established in North America, the route extending from Falmouth, New England, to Savannah, Ga., 1775; New York (11th state) ratified U. S. Constitution, 1788.

White Pine Much in Use

White pine, a light wood, is used for window sashes, frames and doors, or in other places where it is exposed to the weather, because it shrinks and swells very little. Other woods in the same class are cedar, redwood, yellow poplar and fir. A few of the desirable heavier woods are black locust and hickory. Most heavy woods such as ash, hickory, beech, birch and oak will shrink or swell more than the lighter woods.
