

Summary of 1935 Local Legislation Affecting Haywood County

Ed. Note—This is the third of a series of articles, giving the laws passed by the 1935 legislature relative to Haywood county and municipalities in the county.

House Bill 1820, prohibited the setting of steel traps, box traps or dead falls in fields or streams excepting those set within the home enclosure to protect domestic fowls. The law prohibits killing a fox with a gun, or smoking or digging a fox out of holes in the ground or cliffs, except that a fox may be killed with a gun, to protect domestic fowls, on the home premises. Penalty for violation not less than \$5 and costs nor more than 30 days.

Chapter 107, Public Laws, as amended by Chapter 238, Public Laws, fixed special game seasons in nine western counties, one of which was Haywood. The seasons fixed are as follows:

- Squirrel—Sept. 15 to Dec. 15.
- Rabbit—Nov. 20 to Feb. 1.
- Quail—Nov. 20 to Feb. 1.
- Fox, with dogs only—year round open season.

This law makes it a misdemeanor in these counties (not exceeding 500 or 300 days) to sell squirrel to any hotel, restaurant or other buyer, for market or otherwise. In so far as those game regulations conflict with the general state-wide game law (Chapter 486, Public Laws) subsequently passed, they are probably inoperative.

Chapter 418, Public Laws, permits two or more municipalities in Haywood to establish, maintain and operate joint water or sewerage facilities, to issue joint or several bonds for this purpose, to levy uniform tax in each municipality, or to issue separate tax notes, in proportion to the tax valuation in each municipality or as agreed upon. To this end they are given the right of eminent domain, and to charge water rates, and sewerage rates not exceeding 15c per 1,000 gallons of water used, such charges to be liens on property served. A higher service charge to persons outside the municipalities is permitted, and a lower rate may be made industrial plants. Delinquent users be disconnected, and wrongful connection is a misdemeanor. The State Board of Health or local health officer may require persons near sewerage system to connect to the system in the interests of public health.

Chapter 321, Public-Local Laws, directs the acceptance at par of bonds due or to become due in the fiscal year in payment of taxes and paving assessments due prior to 1933, by any municipality in Haywood county; and authorizes the municipalities, in the discretion of the governing authorities, to accept at par street improvement bonds, regardless of the date of maturity, for street assessments.

Chapter 90, Private Laws, provided that the members of the Canton Graded School District Board of Trustees be elected, as the terms of the present members expire, on Tuesday after the first Monday in June in a non-partisan election, to serve for four years. At the 1937 election three members are to be elected, two for four years and one for two years, and the Governor shall appoint two more members—not more than three members—are to be from the same political party. Vacancies are to be filled by the Board of Elections of three members, not more than two of whom shall be from the same party—O. M. Hampton, F. S. Branson, and George Frostel are appointed to the board for six year terms, their successors to be named by the Clerk of the Superior Court. This board is to conduct the elections, appoint the election officials, etc., call for a new registration, keep the election and registration books and provide voting places.

Chapter 131, Private Laws, create a board of municipal elections for Canton (H. S. Bell for six years, chairman; C. Guy Higgs, for four years and Charles Westmoreland, for two years), the successors to be appointed by the aldermen for six years, not more than two from the same party. Each would receive \$1.00 compensation for each election. The board is to supervise town elections. The law prescribes filing dates—10 days before each election—and fees—\$10 each—for all candidates. The board shall require a new registration before the 1935 election and any town election thereafter. Two sets of officials were to act for the 1935 election—one by the aldermen and one by the board, but thereafter they will be appointed by the board. There are other provisions concerning the registration books.

Chapter 119, Private Laws, repeal-

ed the 17th Section of Chapter 90, Private Laws, 1907—the Canton Town Charter—which provided that all residents of Canton liable for road duty under the County Road law are liable for six days work per year on the Canton streets and which allowed such person to pay \$6 in lieu of such work.

Chapter 32, Private Laws, authorized the Canton authorities to cancel all or part of the special assessments now due for sidewalks, curb and gutter, street paving or sewer, against church property on satisfactory showing that such property will be used permanently for church purposes.

2. Waynesville:

House Bill 834, passed without a roll call vote, purported to authorize the town to contribute from any surplus on hand for a public library and, if approved by the voters, to direct a levy of an annual tax not exceeding 6c on the \$100 valuation for this purpose. The aldermen are allowed to appoint six trustees to supervise the library, not more than one member of the board to be a trustee, for term of six years. The first terms are to be two for two years, two for four years, two for six years. No library fees are to be charged school children except penalties for not returning the books.

House Bill 885 permitted Waynesville to make an annual appropriation for the Waynesville Library Association, such sum to come from unexpended surplus. The town may make contracts with the association relating to the library.

III. Omnibus Laws Affecting County:

Chapter 295, Public Laws, appointed the following justices of the peace for Haywood County:

- Beverdam Township: W. S. Smathers (two years.)
- Waynesville Township: R. Q. McCracken (six years.)
- Pigeon Township: Haynes Warren, Gaston Burnett (two years.)

Chapter 296, Public Laws, appointed for two year terms from the first Monday in May, 1935, Homer V. Cagle, R. T. Messer, and J. B. Best, as members of the Haywood County Board of Education.

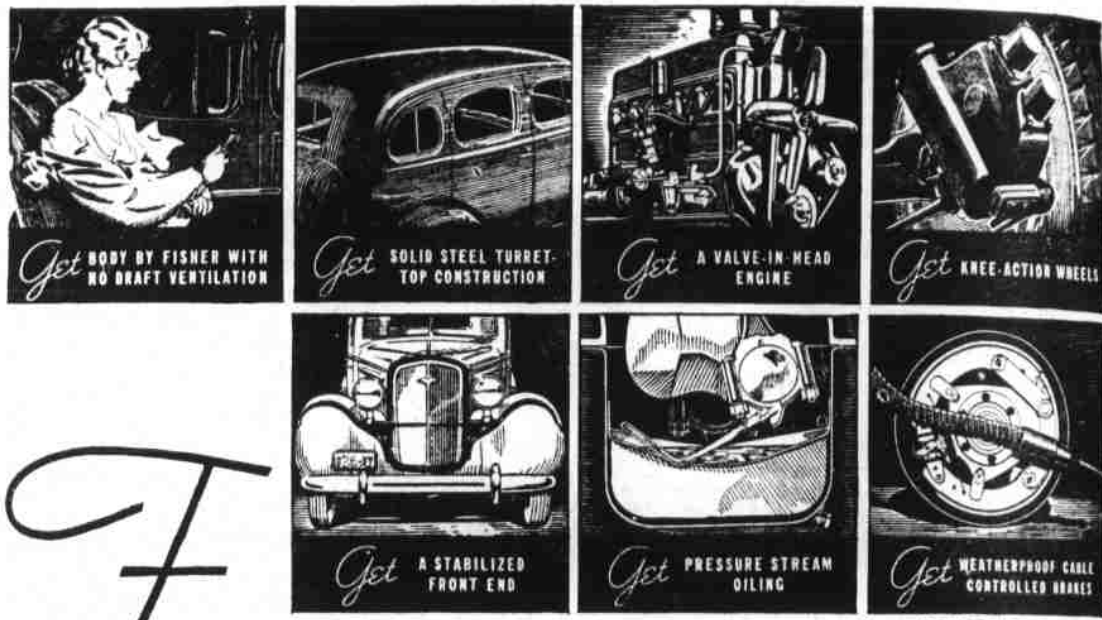
