

Gets Drunk, And Loses His License

Boyd Coats, of East Laurinburg, was the first one in the state to lose his driver's license under the new law. He was convicted of driving while drunk. For 12 months he will not be allowed to drive a car.

The law is that if such a person is found guilty of driving after having their license revoked, may be guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction shall be punished by imprisonment for not more than six months, and there may be imposed in addition thereto a fine of not more than \$500.

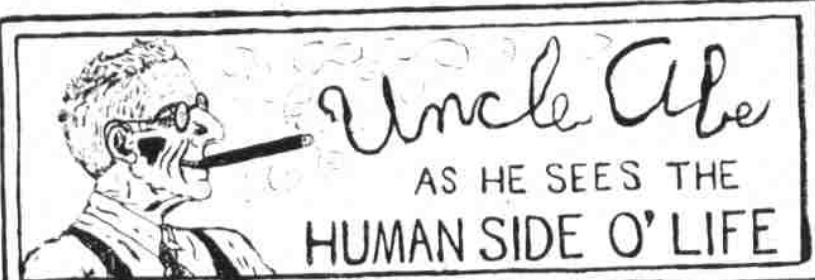

This is the first time that such accurate records have been required.

3 ADDED TO HALL OF FAME

Three more names have been added to the list of distinguished Americans elected to the Hall of Fame—those of Grover Cleveland, twice president of the United States, William Penn, who founded Pennsylvania, and Simon Newcomb, the mathematician and astronomer. While Cleveland lost favor during his second term with some members of the Democratic party, he rates as one of the great presidents, and his stalwart figure belongs with the other great political leaders in the Hall of Fame.

HALLE SELASSIE'S CHECK IN U. S.

Through the New York Clearing House last week there passed a check (\$50) written in the Amharic language and personally endorsed by Halle Selassie. It was drawn on the National Safety Bank and Trust Company of New York, and it represented a gift to the Ethiopian Red Cross from Max J. Schneider, the bank's president. The Emperor's Amharic endorsement (in which the date is given by the Ethiopian calendar) was translated: "Received at the time of the Maskal Feast and sent to the Red Cross. Halle Selassie, I, Sept. 25, 1929."

Imports Of Ethiopia More Than Exports

The following information about Ethiopia should be of interest to our readers:

Title—Empire of Ethiopia.
Location—East Africa, bounded by Eritrea, French Somaliland, British Somaliland, Italian Somaliland, Kenya Colony and Anglo-Egyptian Sudan.

Area—350,000 square miles.
Climate and Topography—Torrid in lowlands, temperate and healthy in plateau regions. Plains surmounted by plateaus and mountains, rising to a height of 12,000 to 15,000 feet. Lake Tsana is the source of the Blue Nile.

Capital—Addis Ababa (Population 70,000.)
Population—100,000,000 (est.) (28.5 to square mile.)

National Language—Amharic.
Government—Emperor supreme ruler, but by constitution of 1931 a legislature of two chambers was given to the people. A number of ministers and a council of elders of the Crown advise the Emperor. Slave-trading abolished in 1923.

Ruler—Haile Sallassie I, Emperor, King of Kings of Ethiopia, the Conquering Lion of Judah and the Elect of God.

Religion—Christian of Coptic sect. One quarter of male population are priests, which class alone are educated.

Value of Exports (1929-30)—\$4,600,800.
Value of Imports (1929-30)—\$4,700,900.

Chief Exports and Products—Hides, skins, coffee, beeswax, cereals, cotton, sugar cane, castor beans, vegetables, live-stock, gold, platinum, etc.

Chief Occupation—Agriculture.

Honorary Consul General of Ethiopia in New York—John H. Shaw.

American Charge d'Affaires in Addis Ababa—Cornelius Van H. Engert.

Member of the League of Nations.

UNEMPLOYED TEACHERS TO BE GIVEN WORK

Unemployed teachers of Western North Carolina who have been without work since the closing of the ERE schools in the summer have recently received cheerful news from Geo. W. Coan, Jr., state WPA director, who stated that within a short time all unemployed teachers will be given work.

Mrs. J. M. Day has already been re-appointed director of the emergency education program, of this district for the coming year. Miss Jane Brown, who was supervisor of the work in Haywood county, resigned several weeks ago and is now teaching in the county schools. Her successor has not as yet been named.

Depression Cost Over 26 Billions

Government officials in Washington have figured that the depression cost the staggering sum of \$26,631,000,000 to business of the nation.

The Commerce Department reported this sum had been taken out of savings to make up the difference between expenses and the value of goods and services produced. It noted that a marked improvement in 1934 failed to prevent another loss.

This does not seem to be enough to meet the increasing needs of shoppers and travelers. It became known last week that the mints have been working this year at twice the rate of 1934, when small coin production was the greatest in any year since 1919.
