Some Plants Are Strong

Plants, like athletes, are able to perform relatively prodigious feats of strength when subjected to a rigorous course of physical exercise, University of Illinois scientists have discovered. After tying heavier and heavier weights to the leaves of a mimosa plant, it was found that after three ten-day periods of such training, the leaf stem not only required less time to return to position, but could support heavier weights than an unconditioned plant. It is suggested that hothouse plants may be weaker than wild varieties because they get less exercise in resisting breezes.

Cave of Mummies Discovered

In limestone caves of the coastal mountains of New Guinea rows of mummles of men, their chins on their hands, their elbows on their knees, have been discovered.
