Universal suffrage, including the right of women to vote, was not extended to all the major possessions of the United States until last week when the Organic Act of the United States Islands gave the vote to women over 21 years of age who are able to read and write English.

Millions of acres are threatened with the "plague" of grasshoppers. The devastation of 1931 and 1932, reports the Agriculture Department, are the most serious in sections of Iowa, Nebraska, Kansas, Oklahoma, Missouri, and Montana.

In the first 10 years the number of planes in the aviation industry in this country has more than doubled. Planes in operation have increased in number, miles flown by them, and commercial and private flying has increased fourfold, annual passenger mileage is 17 times as much as the total number of passengers carried last year by the scheduled airlines was 149 times 1926.

Reserves of the United States, Secretary W. A. Selvig, of the Bureau of Mines, will last several thousand tons, but the known oil reserves will last only 15 years at the present rate of consumption.

One out of every three farmers in the United States is engaged in growing cotton. It is the largest cash crop, bringing to the growers twice as much as wheat, the next largest crop in 1935.

Approximately one-fourth of the \$500,000,000 in the Home Owners' Loan Corporation on March 31 was in delinquent mortgages had been increased to about 1 per cent of the total loans extended.

Selling in some other branch of the field of distribution is the occupation of one out of every six persons between the ages of 18 and 25, gainfully employed in large cities. In the country as a whole, points out the Office of Education, one person out of every 10 is so employed.

A study of the fundamental causes of unemployment has been started by the Works Progress Administration. It will survey re-employment opportunities, DPA announces, and study the effect of technological improvements in industry.

No other part of the population of the country is showing as rapid a rate of increase as the Indian race, according to John Collier, Commissioner of Indian Affairs. But even though the increase continues at the rate of last year, not until some time in the next century would there be as many Indians living in the United States as were in the area when Columbus discovered America.

Banks insured by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, representing 93 of all commercial banks in the country and 97 per cent of all commercial bank deposits, declared dividends in 1935 amounting to \$299,000,000, as compared with \$188,000,000 in 1934.

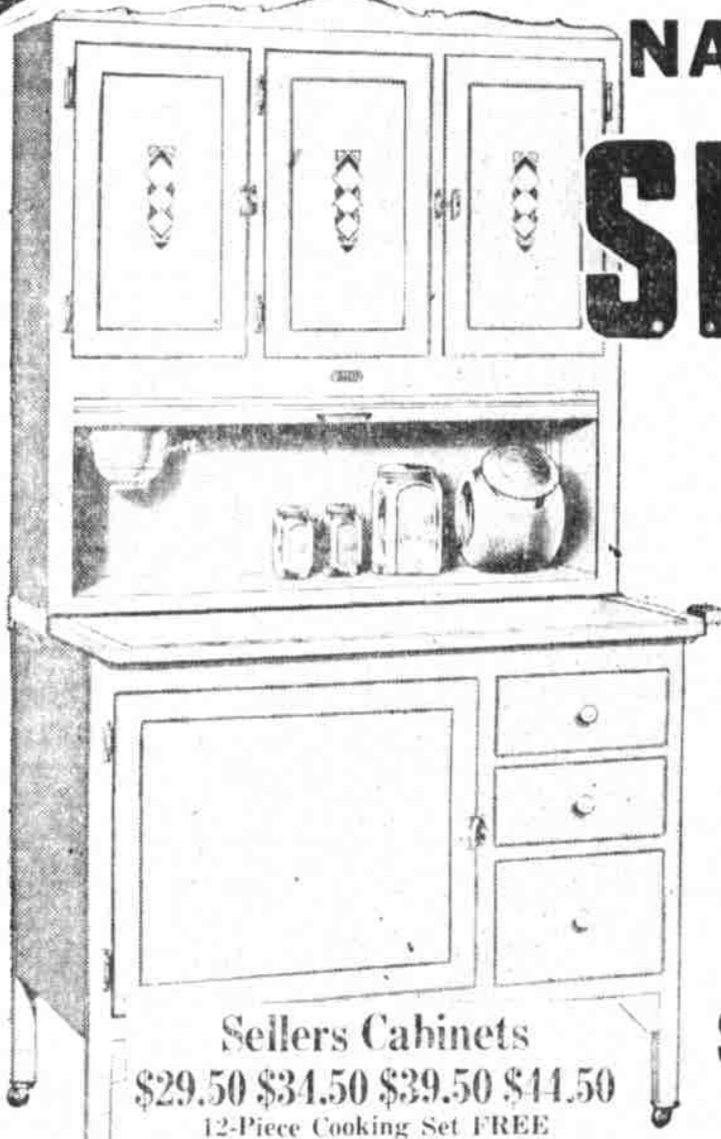

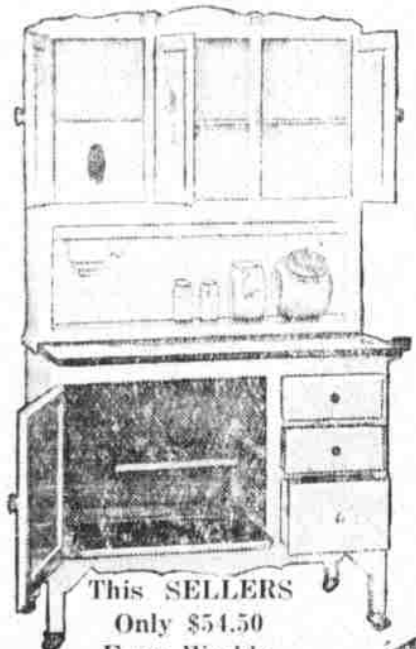
