DEMOCRATS NOMINATE ROOSE-VELT AND GARNER


The Democratic convention held in Philadelphia last week adjourned Saturday night after nominating Roosevelt and Garner as the Demoeratic standard bearers in the fall election.



SELASSIE ADDRESSES LEAGUE Haile Selassie, the emperor without an empire, addressed the League of Nations Tuesday amid boos and cheers. Cursing and fighting occurred in the galleries, and police had to be called to take the disturbers out. Selassie said he "could not believe that fifty-two nations . . . could be defeated by a single aggressor." Other notable statements were: "You deserted us to Italy," and "God and history will remember your judgment.
