26-Inch Trout Be Given Aug. 15th. | Caught Saturday In Cataloochee

What is believed to be the largest rout ever caught from a Haywood stream, was landed Saturday morning by Fred Ferguson, of Clyde. The trout weighed five pounds dressed, and measured 26-inches long. The weight was about 61/2 pounds when caught.

The trout was caught by Mr. Ferguson in Cataloochee, in about two feet of water near a rock pust above Jarvis Palmer's at what is known to firshermen on the reck a Wildcat Bend.

Many fishermen believe that they have hooked this trout in the past but none were able to land him. It was estimated that the fish was at least eight years old.

The hook caught the fish in the lower side, and held firm in a fin.

The fish was landed in about two minutes, and quickly gave up the battle because of the shallow water. Mr. Ferguson saw the fish some time before he hooked it. Just before catching the big one, Mr. Ferguson landed a half dozen about nine inches

1,351 People Are Given Tubercular **Examination Here**

The District Health department con-ducted a clinic for the examination of suspected cases of tuberculosis, of suspected cases of tuberculosis, largely referred by physicians, for the period of June 22nd to July 10th, inclusive. The examinations were made by Dr. H. L. Seay, a specialist from the State Tuberculosis Sanatorium. The examination consisted of a fluoroscopic examination of all applicants with a complete chest examinacants, with a complete chest examina-tion of selected cases. A total of 1,351 individuals were examined by 1.351 individuals were examined by Dr. Seay, among which number it was found that 78 were infected with childhood type of tuberculosis, and 36 with the adult type. These were new cases not having formerly been diagnosed. Also, 56 individuals that had nosed. Also, 56 individuals that had previously been diagnosed as having tuberculosis were examined. In addition 3 individuals were designated as probably having tuberculosis, and 11 doubtful case, were found. A total of 1,044 were free from any indication of having the disease.

In Haywood county 377 individuals were examined, among which 23 new cases of childhood type, and 10 new cases of adult type tuberculosis were found. Also, 27 individuals who had previously been diagnosed as having tuberculosis were examined. One case was declared to be doubtful, and 297 were found to be free of tuberculosis. Seven of the positive cases were advised to take sanatorium treatment, 30 were advised to take home treatment, and 18 were advised

to have X-ray pictures made.

The successful handling of tuberculosis depends almost entirely upon rn early diagnosis. The health de-partment expects to have a clinic of this nature annually, and by so doing assist the physicians in confirming their diagnosis at a stage of the disease when much can be accomplished in its treatment.
