### President Roosevelt Has Overcome His Physical Handicap Cheerfully

Regardless of varying political theories there is one thing about President Roosevelt which draws the admiration of everybody. That is the patience, and the indomitable will which he has displayed in the face of a malady which laid low in middle life, and which have put most men completely out of the picture. He seems to have defied his general health, and he succeeded in minimizing what would prove a terrible handicap to most of us until people scarcely noticed that he is afflicted. Not only Mr. Roosevelt disregarded this physical handicap, but his intimates developed a real art in concealing it from the public. Photographs of the President standing behind a railing and walkways to platforms usually draped so that few see him walk. From this I gather that he does not to excite any sympathy among the folks. He asks no odds and he is crippled, does not want

the folks to pay it any mind, but wants to be measured from his eyes up.

At the Charlotte meeting I stood by the edge of the walkway which had been constructed from the armory to the stadium, and watched Brother Roosevelt go by. With his son on one arm and some friend on the other the President dragged slowly along. It was easy enough to see that he was bearing some weight on those who assisted him. He dragged feet which no longer respond to the will. But it looked as though he had simply said, "Legs, I am going to do a heap of tramping about the country, and you had just as well come on." And he has become one of the most traveled Presidents we have ever had. No wonder that man got elected. He pays no more mind to a great affliction than the average man would pay to a briar scratch. He just puts on that famous smile, throws back his head, and moves serenely on his way.

### Highlights Of Mr. Roosevelt's Charlotte Speech

Charlotte.—Highlights of President Roosevelt's address before the "Seven States Green Factures" Democratic Rally:

"If history gives a name to the age in which we are living, I hope it will call this the 'Era of Rebuilding.'"

"In respect to cotton I had a definite objective: . . . to get 10 cent cotton our first year in office and to get 1 cent cotton or more for the next three years. . . I ask you in simple fairness, have we attained that goal?"

"I don't believe that the great tobacco growing states of the nation wish to go back to the days of 'every man for himself and let the devil take the hindmost.'"

"We have enabled the public, through a practical prosperity, to begin to pay their debts, to paint their homes, to buy farm tools and automobiles, to send more boys and girls through school and college, to put some money in the bank and, incidentally, to know for the first time that the money in the bank is safe."

"A family that tries to subsist on a total wage income of \$400 a year is just as much a drag on the prosperity of America as the farm family that seeks to subsist on a yearly cash income of \$100."

" . . . And common sense, logical governmental policy had to begin with the building up of farm and other property values, and crop values, and the increase of workers wages if that now historic corner was ever to be turned."

### Weaving Project To Begin October First
