

Mountaineers To Play Asheville On Friday Afternoon

The local team, although much lighter, are ready to give and take, hoping to return with another game on the winning side. In Precinct No. 1 of Beaverdam Township, from the former polling place on Highway No. 10, to the Canton High School building.

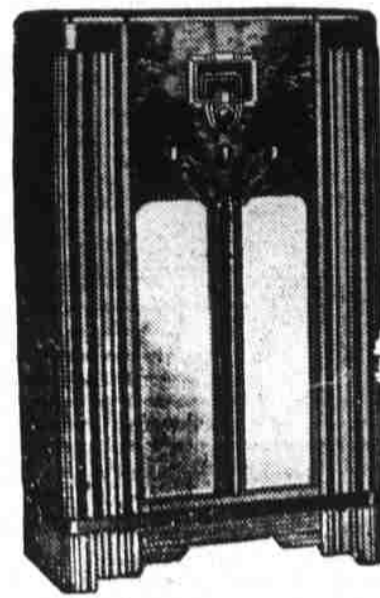
