Twelve of the 1,700 students enrolled at the Woman's College of the University of North Carolina for the fall semester are from Haywood county. Of the 100 counties of the state, 97 have representatives in the student body, which is the largest in recent years. Last year's registration was 1,563, and the figures for the previous year was 1,382. Dr. W. C. Jackson is dean of the administration of the Woman's College.
