The bride of fifty years ago was before her marriage, Miss Julia S. Telford, and was born near Atlanta, Ga., in 1850. Her father, who was a Presbyterian minister, took his family and slaves and refugees down the Suwanee river, in northern Florida, as their home was in the direct route of General Sherman's army, in his famous march to the sea. In 1879 as a result of a great flood on the river, the family moved to Fort Reed near Sanford, Florida, where Mrs. Lindsley resided until her marriage.

The groom was born in Rochester, Minn., in 1854. Ten years later his family moved to Philadelphia, where they resided until 1876, and three years later to New York City.

In 1890 Mr. and Mrs. Lindsley moved to Waynesville, where for 25 years the former was the principal owner of the Waynesville Book Company. In 1928 Mr. Lindsley sold his interests and retired from active business.

During their residence here, Mr. and Mrs. Lindsley and in later years their daughter, Miss Sue Willard Lindsley, have taken an active part in the social, religious and civic affairs of the community.

ty courts for many years, having served as justice of the peace for fifty years, having held the office of register of deeds for four years, and was a United States revenue commissioner for seven years, having had his office in three public houses.

His first term as register of deeds was served in the court house opposite the present post office, part of which is now the building occupied by the Waynesville Motor Company, and more familiarly known as the Turbyfill building. Incidentally the first court house of the county, which was a log structure, was located on the lot adjoining the present Methodist church.

On November the 4th, 1884, according to the squire, he moved his office as register of deeds into the present court house, on the site of the present building. The third court house was considered a very fine building in its day, and according to Mr. McCracken, was fully paid for the year it was completed. Here he also had his office while United States revenue commissioner.

In the new, the fourth court house for the county he has rounded out his half century as a justice of the peace. The squire claims to have married more persons than anyone in the county, his record having passed the one thousand mark.

On December the 5th, 1872, Mr. McCracken was married to Miss Mary Tate, daughter of J. M. Tate and Nancy Shook Tate, the latter the daughter of Jacob Shook, one of the leading early settlers of the county.

Applications For Crop Loans Ready

Application for emergency crop and feed loans for 1937 are now being received at court house, Waynesville, by S. S. Williams, field supervisor of the Emergency Crop and Feed Loan section of the Farm Credit Administration.

These loans will be made only to farmers who cannot obtain credit from any other source, as provided in regulations issued by the governor of the Farm Credit Administration. The money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediate and actual cash needs for growing his 1937 crops or for the purchase of feed for livestock and in no instance may exceed \$400.

D. I. L. Smathers, 76, Buried At Clyde Sun.

Miss Ruth Morgan, Miss Helen Smathers, and Miss Janice Smathers.

Mr. Smathers has been for many years an outstanding leader in the political and financial life of Haywood county. He was a large property owner, and has been one of the leading cattlemen in the county. He had served as mayor of Clyde for 12 years, and was a member of the county board of commissioners for two years. He served as a justice of the peace for some years, and was a member of the school committee of Clyde for twenty-five years.

His home in Clyde is one of the most historical buildings in the county, part of it having been erected by Jacob Shook in 1795, and while remodeled, in the third story still remains the chapel where Bishop Asbury held services.

He was the son of Levi and Sallie Cook Smathers. In January, 1879, he was married to Miss Mattie Killian, who died in November, 1924.

Always interested in his town and his county Mr. Smathers was liberal in his contributions to both charity and church work, and could always be counted upon for support of worthy causes.

Surviving are one daughter, Mrs. J. H. Morgan, of Clyde, three sons, O. L., W. G., and J. H. Smathers, all of Clyde; one sister, Mrs. Nancy Haynes; 12 grandchildren and 11 great grandchildren.
