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Court Plan Threatens Democratic Party Split



Fear of a Democratic party split over the president's plan for revision of the supreme court gave impetus to a movement for a compromise settlement of the dispute. When Attorney General Cummings appeared before the senate judiciary committee in defense of the plan, Mrs. Millard Tydings, wife of Maryland's senator, and Mrs. Henry Ashurst, wife of Arizona's senator, top, were among the spectators. One of the impromptu debates on the floor of the committee session was between Senator Tom Connally, left, below, of Texas, opponent of the plan, and Senator Key Pittman, of Nevada, who favors Roosevelt's reorganization program.

PRESIDENT AT WARM SPRINGS

President Roosevelt arrived at Warm Springs, Ga., on Friday for a two week's vacation at the winter White House. He was not expected to do much work, it was reported. He was accompanied by White House secretaries and by W. C. Bullitt, ambassador to France, who had just arrived from Paris, and had not had an opportunity to talk with the President, at any length before he left Washington.

CHURCH UNION

As a practical demonstration of the church union which he advocates, John D. Rockefeller, Jr., last week urged eleven Protestant churches in Tarrytown and North Tarrytown, N. Y., to unite in a church center. He asked 1,000 persons at a union Lenten service: "Shall we let our personal preferences and feelings lead us to adhere to the church of the past even if so doing we know that it will die with us?"

Boy Wants First Lady To Wear Gun Like Cowboy

Explaining she takes a pistol along while driving alone in her car because the secret service asked her to, the First Lady laughingly recounted:

"The day after that story appeared, a little boy came up to me and almost cried he was so disappointed that I wasn't actually wearing a pistol around my waist in a holster."

BACK TO DUTY

Last week President Roosevelt recalled Joseph P. Kennedy back to public service. The Ship Subsidy Act of 1936 established a new agency, the United States Maritime Commission, composed of five members. A temporary commission was appointed last summer, and now a permanent body has been selected, with Mr. Kennedy chairman. His work will consist in part of the organization of the agency that seeks to bring a new deal into the merchant marine by granting government subsidies, by specifying crews, wages and reasonable working conditions. Mr. Kennedy is a successful financier, and helped the government in 1934 to regulate the stock markets and curb excessive speculations. Paramount Pictures paid him \$50,000 for suggestions of plans for re-organization. The Radio Corporation of America paid him \$150,000 for a recapitalization scheme. In that same busy year he found time to write a campaign book, "I'm For Roosevelt."

A POLITICAL ANALYST

When James A. Farley, Democratic National chairman a week before the last presidential election, predicted confidently and correctly—all the polls to the contrary notwithstanding—that his candidate would carry forty-six states, the forecast was solidly based on the charts, graphs, and tables of his assistant, Emil Hurja, the man who put mathematics into politics. Mr. Hurja, son of a Finnish immigrant, has been an Alaska gold miner, a newspaper man, and a financial analyst in Wall Street. He first took his statistics into politics in the 1932 campaign and came out 97 per cent correct. In 1934 and again in 1936 his analysis helped Mr. Farley. Mr. Hurja who was earning a salary of \$10,000 in politics, resigned last week to go into private business.
