1,300 Children Are Served Hot Lunches

There are eleven WPA lunch rooms in Haywood county, serving 1,300 children per day with hot lunches, this does not mean merely a bowl of soup, but a nourishing meal. They are co-operative lunch rooms, each child bringing vegetables, canned vegetables, fruits, dairy products and farm produce in exchange for lunch, or paying 5c the actual cost of the food.

There has been remarkable gain in weight and efficiency in school work among the children eating in the lunch rooms. The school attendance has been increased in every school, one school 10 per cent over last year.

A fine spirit of co-operation exists between the parents and the lunch room workers. Each community had to furnish equipment, stoves, dishes, and other necessary supplies. In buying this they have used good judgment, selecting permanent equipment.

There are 32 workers and one supervisor. The government has spent \$4,261.50 on this project. 80,086 lunches have been served.—(Contributed.)
