Federation After Million Dollars For Coming Year

H. Arthur Osborne Elected Director For Another Two Years From Haywood

H. Arthur Osborne of Canton, was nominated for another two-year term as a director of the Farmers Federation of Haywood county at the annual meeting of the Haywood county stockholders of farmers' cooperative in the Waynesville building at 2 o'clock Monday afternoon. Mr. Osborne, besides being a director is also a member of the Federation's executive committee.

Each county where the federation operates is entitled to two representatives on its directorate. R. T. Boyd, of Waynesville, route 2 is the other Haywood director. His term extends for another year. In addition to the two directors, Haywood county also is represented on the federation board by a director-at-large, Henry Francis, of Waynesville.

Election of directors terminated at county stockholders' meetings is to take place at the annual meeting of stockholders of the entire organization. This meeting is to be held at 10 o'clock Saturday morning in the assembly room of the Buncombe county court house at Asheville.

The Haywood county advisory committee, which is in the management of the federation, was called in Waynesville Monday night, was presided over by Mr. R. T. Boyd and was composed of Mr. R. T. Boyd, chairman; Mr. Frank A. Brock, secretary; Glenn Boyd, route 2; R. T. Boyd, route 2; J. H. McMillan, route 2; Glenn Palmer, route 2; R. F. Davis, route 2; N. W. Carter, route 2; and C. E. Green, route 2.

A resolution passed by R. T. Boyd, which was promptly adopted, set a date for the annual meeting for the year 1937-38, to be held at Asheville, N. C., on Saturday, March 20, at 10 o'clock. The meeting and general manager, reported the organization's business last year totaled \$499,000. A study of the advantages of the federation to farmers was made by Van B. Brown, head of the National Agricultural Department.

Following the meeting the contest of "Oliver Chilled Plow" was engaged. Mrs. Grady Davis being the winner.

The club adjourned to meet with Mrs. R. F. Davis in April.

Annual Meeting Of Farmers Federation Set For Saturday

The annual meeting of stockholders of the Farmers Federation, Inc., has been called for 10 o'clock Saturday morning, March 20, in the assembly room of the Buncombe County court house.

This farmers' co-operative, formed in 1929 by a handful of farmers of the Fairview section of Buncombe county, now has 3,109 stockholders and operates 15 warehouses in nine Western North Carolina counties, in addition to a cannery, baby chick hatcheries, sweet potato curing houses and home industries.

Reports on activities of the federation during the past year will be submitted Saturday by James G. K. McClure, Jr., president and general manager; Guy M. Sales, assistant general manager, and by departmental heads.

Motion pictures will be shown depicting the varied activities of the co-operative.

Principal business to come before the stockholders will be the election of nine regular directors and three directors-at-large. Each county where the federation operates is entitled to two regular directors, each to serve for two years.
