Representatives From Eight Counties Coming Here Today To Take Action

Representatives from eight counties in Western North Carolina are scheduled to gather here this morning at ten o'clock at the office of the Chamber of Commerce, to review the recent developments regarding the routing of the Blue Ridge Parkway

A representative of the Park Service will attend the meeting, according to a telegram received here yesterday from Congressman Zebulon Weaver, Besides the park representative, there will be representatives from the eight counties, J. C. Walker, district highway engineer, E. L. McKee, of Sylva, member of the state highway commission, R. Getty Browning, chief loeating engineer of the state highway For Park Funds department, and Dr. Harold W. Foght, of the Cherokee Indian Reservation.

It was definitely learned from groups are bringing "pressure to bear" that would change the route of the Blue Ridge Parkway from following the original route from Asheville via Pisgah, Tennessee Bald, Balsam Gap and into the park.

All the counties that will be represented are definitely opposed to making any changes in the proposed route of the Blue Ridge Parkway.

The factions opposing the original route as approved by Secretary Harrold lekes several years ago, are seeking a federal survey that goes across Madison county direct to Gatlingburg,

leaving this entire area out. In the meantime, a letter from Congressman Weaver yesterday, assured the group that he was definitely opposed to any changes from the original route. Mr. Weaver said: "I know that there has been some uneasiness about rumors that the route might be shifted, but in so far as I know there is nothing official or authoritative inthis way. I would, of course, very vigorously oppose any change of plans in this respect."
