Important Positions Filled By Gov. Hoey

Governor Hoey on Tuesday of this week appointed eight judges and a solicitor. They were as follows: Supreme Court Justices, M. V. Barnhill, of Rocky Mount and J. Wallace Winborne, of Marion.

Regular Superior Court judges were: Luther Hamilton, of Morehead City, G. V. Cowper, of Kinston, Frank S. Hill, of Murphy, and Sam J. Ervin, Jr., of Morganton.

Superior Court solicitor Erle McMichael, of Winston-Salem.

All appointments are effective July 1, with the special judges for terms of two years, and the regular judges until January, 1939.

The long awaited appointments of Barnhill and Winborne have given the citizens of the state much concern. They have wondered who would fill the two extra bench positions made by the popular mandate that the Supreme Court be increased from five to seven and at the same time open two new vacancies.

Likewise has interest centered in the chairmanship of the State Democratic Executive committee, a post held by Winborne, for the past five years. The governor for this post has recommended R. Clegg Cherry, of Gastonia, speaker of the 1937 House of Representatives. The recommendation is equivalent to election.

Nation's Deficit Reaches New High

Ever since the United States Government lowered the dollar by raising the price of gold it has been the world's chief customer for gold at the statutory rate of \$35 the ounce. Last week the treasury went on the market to borrow another \$800,000,000—partly to provide funds for buying more gold. The loan brought the government to the new high level—\$36,200,000,000. The monetary gold stocks of the United States are more than \$12,000,000,000. To prevent inflation of credit the treasury has sought to "sterilize" its excess gold by putting it into an "inactive account." Last week Senator Thomas, of Oklahoma, a member of the cheap-money bloc in Congress, introduced a bill authorizing the treasury to issue currency against all its sterilized holdings. The bill will not have administration sponsorship.

Tax Dodgers Trying To Make Settlement

An administration leader stated this week that an imminent inquiry into alleged "tax dodging" has prompted certain wealthy persons to try to make cash settlements with the treasury. Senator Harrison, of Mississippi, said that one check for \$200,000 had been sent in by a citizen, "oddsy stricken by his conscience right at this particular time." The congressional investigation into President Roosevelt's charges of tax evasion full avoidance by wealthy persons is scheduled to begin today with full publicity given each case.

Author of Labor Act Passes Away

Representative William P. Connery, Democrat, chairman of the House Labor committee and co-author of the Connery labor act, died Tuesday from what physicians indicated was "food poisoning." He was ill only a few hours. The little bald New Englander, once a hooper on the vaudeville stage, died before his family could reach his bedside. Connery was one of the best liked members of the House. He was chatty and loved by all. As chairman of the labor committee he fought for passage of a 39-hour week bill.

Paul Kelly, of the Department of Conservation and Development announced this week. The announcement was made following a conference between the advertising committee of the Conservation Department and the representatives of Eastman-Scott and Company, agent handling the quarter-million-dollar publicity campaign. Members of the agency said they had received numerous invitations to address various civic bodies on the background and purpose of the program. They indicated they would fill as many of these requests as possible.

Confederate Vets To Get \$182.50 Checks

Two hundred and thirty-four checks of \$182.50 each, were mailed from the Pension Division of the State Auditor's office this week, for distribution beginning yesterday, to Confederate war veterans in 71 counties of North Carolina. In 29 of the state's 100 counties there are no longer any living veterans of the War Between the States on the pension roll. A total of \$254,255 was paid this month as the semi-annual pension payment to Confederate veterans, their widows and

aged negroes who accompanied their masters into the battle-grounds during the war.
