Good Squirrel Season Indicated

Season Opened Yesterday. Hunters Pleased With Game

Deer Season To Open October 15th. Hunters Disappointed With Bear Prospects

An ideal squirrel season, is the prediction of Haywood sportsmen, who took to the woods yesterday as the season opened. From now until December 15, squirrels may be hunted. County Games Warden, Cody Platt, looked for a "bumper crop" of hunters this fall.

More interest has been shown in hunting this year than in several years past, it was reported. Several sportsmen have bought expensive equipment, and plan to go after game and birds in a "big way."

The deer season opens in Haywood and adjoining counties on October 15, and remains open until December 15. The limit is one a day, and three for the season. Only male deer are to be hunted.

Some sportsmen are not so enthused over the prospects for a good bear season, although the season does not open until October 20, there remains time for conditions to improve for a good season. The bag limit on bear is 2 a day and two a season. The bear season ends January 1.

Opussum and raccoon may be hunted with gun and dogs only. There is no bag limit during the season, which is from October 1 to February 1.

Steel traps for these animals are unlawful in Haywood county, except where set on own premises for the protection of domestic fowls or crops.

Quail and rabbits cannot lawfully be hunted until November 20. The season ends February 15, with a limit of 10 a day, and 150 for the season.

Poindexter's Men Have 11 Hard Games Scheduled. Play Waynesville Twice

(Special to The Mountaineer.—With three weeks of intensive drill behind them the Canton high school Black Bear football machine is putting on the finishing touches of their preparation for their opening game with Andrews Wildcats here Friday night, at 7:30 o'clock.

With a squad of approximately 50 candidates, including eleven 1936 lettermen, working out daily, Coach C. C. Poindexter has indicated that he expects the 1937 Black Bear team to be one of the best balanced in recent years, with plenty of reserve strength available.

The backfield is being built around Bill Flynn, '36 All-Western back, and Howard Sams, another veteran performer. With Clark, center, McClure and Owen, ends, Robertson and Cooper, guards, and Powell, tackle, all veterans, Coach Poindexter is faced only with the problem of developing another satisfactory tackle to have a line that will rate with any in the Blue Ridge Conference.

The Bears will play an eleven game schedule this year, including eight tilts, two of which will be with their traditional rivals, the Waynesville Mountaineers.

The first eight games on their list will be home affairs and will all be played under the floodlights at night on the high school gridiron.

Enka's baseballers proved beyond a doubt last week-end that they were the class of the league, as they defeated a picked all-star team from the other seven clubs, 9-4, 2-6, and 9-3.

The series, which was played in McCormick Field, in Asheville, climaxed what has probably been the Industrial League's most successful season.

In the first contest, on Saturday, "Spider" Cooper, little Enka hurler, limited the all-stars to eight scattered hits, as his mates hit three all-star pitchers for fourteen hits within the first four innings. Ward, Tryon hurler, who is only 16 years old, took over the pitching assignment, and allowed only one hit for the remainder of the game.

In Sunday's double bill, the all-stars, behind the effective pitching of "Stonewall" Jackson, of Green River, who fanned 10 and allowed only 6 hits, took the first game, 6-2, to even the series, but the league chaps came back in the nightcap, to win, 9-3. Robert Putnam, of Hazelwood, started the second game for the all-stars, but was removed in favor of Barley, of Brevard in the sixth frame. Barley soon gave way to Smith, of Green River, however. Clarke, of Hazelwood, and Pittillo, of Brevard, shared the catching duties of the second game. Deal, of Brevard, started at bat in the first game, with 3-4, and Munday, of Enka, led in the second, with 4 hits.

"Dobey Joe" Osborne, of Texas, pinned the broad shoulders of Joe Marsh, 240 pound grappler from Wyoming, to the mat two straight times, after losing the first fall. Osborne, a squat 238 pounder, used rough tactics throughout, and won the final fall amid boos from the 250 fans present.

Marsh took the first fall in about eleven minutes, after he had slipped a "half Nelson" on Osborne, and rode him to the mat. Osborne objected to the fall, and the fans booed him from the ring.

Osborne, however, wasn't long in taking the lead in the second fall, executing a series of toe-holds, body scissors, tackles, and others; he even wrapped the ropes around Marsh's neck and pulled them. "Dobey Joe" turned the trick in the second fall by seating himself a-top Marsh, and pulling him backward by a neck hold, straining his back. Marsh, nursing his weak back, was an easy victim in the third and final fall.
