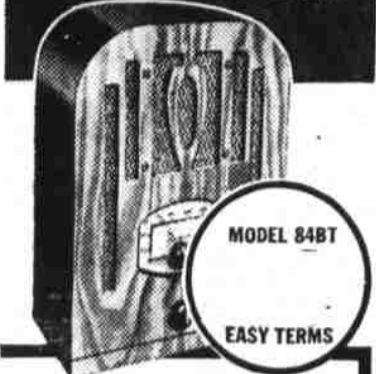


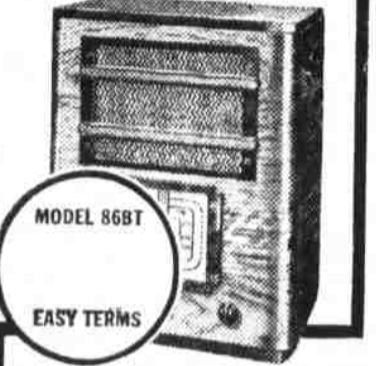

ply Co., which opened for business this past week on Depot street.

For the past twelve years he has devoted his time to problems confronting farmers. He has studied their needs, and being a farmer himself, has applied practical methods to his findings.

Mr. Brown helped organize the Haywood County Farmers Federation in 1925, and was general manager of the Waynesville warehouse when it merged with the Asheville unit in 1934.

When the Haywood county unit was organized, he had charge of most of the buying, and by careful selection of seeds, built up a seed business that was second to none in the section. He bought seeds that were especially adapted to Haywood soils and climate.

He managed the Waynesville warehouse for six years, and during that time, he made many friends. Since 1934 he was manager under the Asheville set-up.

Mr. Brown is called on to recommend the kinds, and amounts of seeds for certain soils and tracts of land. Beside recommending the amount of seeds, he is also capable of judging the best suited grades of fertilizers required for different soils.

He has taken an active part in the affairs of the farmers of the county, and considers himself a farmer as well as a manager of a retail seed and feed store. He was born in the Fines Creek section of the county, and reared on a farm.

The four years that he taught school is the only time that he has not been actively engaged in farming, either directly or indirectly.

Air Mail Week To Be Observed 11-16

Postal officials, together with civic and governmental bodies, are co-operating in observing Air Mail Week in North Carolina October 11 to 16th.

Special planes will make stops in the state on Tuesday, October 12, at every place that has a landing field, and pick up air mail. This mail will be flown to Raleigh or Charlotte, and there placed on regular air mail planes.

The observance of Air Mail Week will give the service a real test to see if each person so using the service will not be benefited by faster mail.

Drinking No Excuse For Automobile Killing

The State Supreme Court, holding that drunkenness offers no excuse for a motorist whose car is involved in a fatal crash, likened such a defense to that of a young man who contributed to the death of his parents, but later pleaded with the court to be merciful to him because he was an orphan.

The tribunal refused to upset two judgments for \$15,000 against Albert J. Boggs, of Marianna. He pleaded he had "passed out" on the rear seat of his car in which he and Robert Peacock had been riding and drinking. Mr. Peacock was given "implied consent" to operate the vehicle, the court said. Mrs. B. C. Butler was killed and Henry C. Whittle injured in a crash which followed.

CREAM OF TOMATO SOUP

- 2 cups tomatoes
 - 1/4 teaspoon soda
 - 1 teaspoon chopped onion
 - 2 cups milk
 - 4 tablespoons flour
 - 2 tablespoons butter
 - 1/2 teaspoon salt
 - 1/4 teaspoon pepper
- Cook first three ingredients together for five to ten minutes and then strain. Melt butter, stir in flour until blended, then cook until thickened.
