Official Meaning Of Inch Of Rainfall

Editor's Note—This is the first of a series of articles which Mr. Hall has agreed to prepare for The Mountaineer. The facts are authentic, and the information herein is interesting.

When the weather bureau reports so many inches, or fractions of an inch of rainfall, it means that a precipitation of moisture, either in the form of rain, snow or hail reduced to its water content, or dew, frost or fog, has fallen. The basis of this measurement is of the amount that has been deposited on a level space, all of it remaining as it fell, without loss by evaporation or otherwise.

Rain gauges are constructed to a scale that records this precipitation in inches and fractions, thereby during any period of time between readings.

Few realize what an enormous weight of water these readings of the rain gauges record. Only a fall of one one-hundredth of an inch means that 62,736 cubic inches have been deposited upon each acre of ground, which weighs, on the basis of the British gallon, one and one-tenth tons. When an inch is recorded it means that 6,272,640 cubic inches have fallen on the acre surrounding the recording gauge, and this water weighs 113 tons. Five inches would weigh 565 tons.

When, over a period of years, records of rain fall have been kept, the weather bureau is able to arrive at what is a normal or average precipitation for a given station.

The Waynesville co-operative station has reported the records of rainfall for almost forty years. From these figures the weather bureau has calculated the monthly normal deficiency from the normal.
