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various local problems. H. Grady Reagan, chairman of the Buncombe county board of Commissioners lead the discussion of welfare work from the viewpoint of the county board of commissioners.

Nathan Yelton, of Raleigh, state director of the division of public assistance explained the methods of his department of work, and the extent of assistance that would be available to the counties.

Miss Lavinia Keys, of Washington, D. C., regional representative of the Federal Social Security Board spoke briefly of the aid to be received through the medium.

The luncheon, which was held in the dining room of the Methodist church, H. Grady presided. At this time the principal address of the day was given by Dr. Paul Ringer, of Raleigh, who spoke on "A for-look in public welfare in North Carolina" carrying out the theme of the day's discussions. The speaker likened welfare work to the relief given by the physician, stating that both were matters of temporary easing of pain,

but that to have real benefit both must be part of a permanent plan. At the luncheon hour all the county superintendents of public welfare and their staff and a number of the state officials were introduced.

Among the officials recognized were, Miss Lilly Mitchell, director of the child welfare division of the State Board; Dr. Roma Cheek, Executive secretary of the State Commission for the Blind; Miss Virginia Dentip, assistant child welfare director; Dr. H. W. Crane, of Chapel Hill, director of Mental Hygiene; Miss Anna Sussatte, director of social work and family rehabilitation, T. L. Greer, state director of CCC; J. S. Kirk, state statistician. Mrs. W. B. Aycock, state director of county organizations; Dr. Nygard, state director of institutions; Wm. Wintgate, of Raleigh, area supervisor, and Miss Crocker, statistician of the Federal Social Security Board of Washington, D. C.

Hosts of the meeting were members of the county welfare board, J. R. Boyd, Jr., chairman, C. E. Brown and H. A. Osborne. Mrs. J. Dale Stentz is county superintendent of public welfare, was in charge of local arrangements.

When Congress opened its special session on Tuesday, there was little doubt that the business situation and measures to reverse the recession would be subjects for Capitol Hill debate and discussion.
