Be it ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Waynesville, North Carolina, as follows: 1. Bonds of the town shall be is-

sued to the maximum aggregate principal amount of \$68,000 for the purpose of refunding the following valid outstanding debt of the town to be cancelled simultaneously with the issue of the bonds to refund the same: \$19,000 6 per cent Local Improve-

ment Bonds, dated February 1, 1922 and payable on the 1st of February \$4000 in 1936, \$7000 in 1937 and \$8000 in 1938. \$9,000 6 per cent Street Improve-

ment Bonds, dated August 1, 1922 and payable on the 1st of February \$3000 in each of the years 1937, 1938 and 1939.

\$16,000 6 per cent Street Bonds, dated October 1, 1925 and payable on the 1st of October \$4000 in each of the years 1935 to 1938 inclusive.

\$6,000 6 per cent Street improvement Bonds, dated July 1, 1926 and payable on the 1st of July \$2000 in

\$12,000 51/2 per cent Street Improvement Bonds, dated March 1, 1927 and payable on the 1st of March \$1000 in 1936, \$1000 in 1937, \$4000 in 1938 and \$6000 in 1939. \$6,000 51/2 per cent Street Improve-

ment Bonds, dated January 1, 1928 and payable on the 1st of January \$2000 in each of the years 1937, 1938 and 1939.

2. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest of the bonds shall be annually levied and collected. 3. A statement of the debt of the town has been filed with the clerk and

is open to public inspection. 4. This ordinance shall take effect upon its passage, and shall not be submitted to the voters.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 30th day of March, 1938, and was first published on the 31st day of March, 1938.
